FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK - OCTOBER 2021



Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ:

And when Jesus saw that a crowd came running together, he rebuked the unclean spirit, saying to it, "You mute and deaf spirit, I command you, come out of him and never enter him again." And after crying out and convulsing him terribly, it came out, and the boy was like a corpse, so that most of them said, "He is dead." But Jesus took him by the hand and lifted him up, and he arose. And when he had entered the house, his disciples asked him privately, "Why could we not cast it out?" And he said to them, "This kind cannot be driven out by anything but prayer" (Mark 9:25-29).

We last heard these words of our Lord among us on the penultimate Sunday of September. Because his own disciples could not cast out the demon, it may seem our Lord is somewhat lacking in power. Which of course He is not. Notice, He speaks a word of rebuke, and the evil spirit must obey. After all, Christ is God; He is the demon's Creator. The issue isn't Christ's lack of power. The fault is with the disciples. The fault is in their thinking that the power is *theirs*. That's why they failed. That's why we fail. And it's often why we fail to act.

You see, Christ doesn't give us power. He gives us access. As Christians, it's when we pray that we access what—Who—can cast out our demons. We often feel powerless because we are. How can we change the course of the events that so deeply and horribly impact our communities? How can we change a community when we cannot even change ourselves? We fail to govern our tongues, or to stop carrying grudges, or to give up our pet vices. How can we ever hope to change our communities? Our families? Our lives? Well, we can't. However, Christ can.

And Christ does.

When you and I gather for church, things happen. (Now, while this is not the focus of this newsletter, I, as your pastor, cannot encourage and admonish you enough to be regular in your church attendance. There is no other place, no other way, to receive the gifts and access we so desperately need.) When we gather for the Divine Service, we, simple people, are made into holy priests. We become the priesthood of believers. And think about what a priest does—intercedes for others. The priest, who has access, brings the requests of the community before the One who has the power to answer.

Rev. Dr. John Kleinig, one of the great scholars of our church body, puts it like this:

As holy priests we all have a common heavenly vocation (Hebrews 3:1), a hidden holy calling in addition to our earthly callings (2 Timothy 1:9). Since we have been justified by the grace of God the Father, we now have open access to His grace through His Son (Romans 5:1–2; Ephesians 3:10–12). Therefore, we may approach Him on behalf of others and the world around us. That's the heart of the mystery for us. We have been appointed to serve as secret agents here on earth for the unseen Father; we are therefore people with double lives, people with a dual identity and a dual calling.¹

You and I "infiltrate" our neighbors' lives, and as we do, we learn what it is they need. We learn what it is we are to pray for. And we have access to the One who can act.

I think this is therefore why prayer is constantly under attack, and why it's often the first thing to go in our busy lives. Satan knows what a powerful tool it is. He would rather have us thinking that the power is ours. But remember, we in ourselves have no power. If he can direct us away from the True source of power, then so much the better for his designs. If he can have us despair in our failures and chuck the whole thing, well happy day for him. And he doesn't much care for us infiltrating his turf. But that's exactly where Christ sends us. As Kleinig notes—we go out as secret agents.

And go out we must. You see, when we look inward and rely on ourselves, of course we will be paralyzed with fear and the prospect of failure. Thus, our inclination will be to do nothing. But how will you know what to bring before our Heavenly Father if you never go out into the community? Plus, as a Christian who is filled with Christ each Sunday, you will have good things to give to your neighbor: the beauty of living with the Commandments, mercy,

forgiveness, and selfless and sacrificial love. As you go out, you will learn what your neighbor needs you to pray for and how it is you need to be a Christian to them.

And remember, you have access! You, in Christ, have access to the Almighty God. And He will act on your request.

So, I suppose I took the scenic route to say what I hope you already know. Come to church. And pray. Oh, get to know your neighbors and community too. Go to meetings. Volunteer. Ask questions. In Christ—as a Christian—you are the salt and the light your neighbor so desperately needs to see clearly and survive. And when you get discouraged and overwhelmed, remember the words of Christ: "*This kind cannot be driven out by anything but prayer*." His is the power, and you have access.

Newsletter article – October 2021

Why do we give? Is it simply because God commands us to? Or is there more to it? To be sure, the Word and instruction of God in the Bible says we should give, and this is sufficient to encourage us to give (Luke 6:38; Acts 20:35; 1 Cor. 16:2; 2 Cor. 8:7; Gal. 6:6).

But there's more to it than just obligation. We're not just trying to fulfill a work of the law. We are bearing fruits of the Spirit given to us by our Father in heaven through His Son our Lord Jesus Christ. In other words, we're not just doing what our Father said, we're also doing what He did.

Children emulate their parents. When they grow up, they often carry many of the same mannerisms and characteristics as their parents. But there is more to it than that. Children copy their parents even on a more mundane level. They watch how their parents cross their legs, how they fold their hands, how they stand and sit and walk, and how they do and say most everything. Then children try to copy it.

This can be quite humorous when caught in the act. They do this even when parents don't want them to. Everyone has been in the uncomfortable – and embarrassing situation – where a child does or says something one of their parents have done or said that is less than polite. Sitcoms thrive on these. It only works because of the truth that children emulate their parents, and they do it because they want to be like them.

We are the children of God – by grace through faith. In Holy Baptism, God the Father declares of us what He declared of Jesus at His Baptism in the Jordan, "You are my beloved Son, in whom I am well pleased." God the Father claims us as His own. He takes away all our sins. In exchange, He gives us His righteousness, His purity, His holiness, and His Spirit – by which we cry out, "Abba, Father."

We are born again – born from above, born of water and the Spirit – to a new life in Christ as His children. We are sons of God in Christ through Baptism. Since we are sons, we are heirs

who share in the glory of the Son of God. The inheritance is ours because of the Father's grace, mercy, and generosity in sending His Son in time to save us for all eternity.

This is why we give generously of our income to the work of the church. We want to be like our heavenly Father. We want to emulate His generosity by being generous ourselves. We give to the work of the church because we have witnessed the generous giving of our Father in heaven.

More than that, we are recipients of it. It is because we have received our Father's gifts that we desire to give ourselves. His gifts are not just spiritual. They are temporal and earthly as well. As *Luther's Small Catechism* teaches in the Fourth Petition of the Lord's Prayer:

Give us this day our daily bread.

What does this mean? God certainly gives daily bread to everyone without our prayers, even to all evil people, but we pray in this petition that God would lead us to realize this and to receive our daily bread with thanksgiving.

What is meant by daily bread? Daily bread includes everything that has to do with the support and needs of the body, such as food, drink, clothing, shoes, house, home, land, animals, money, goods, a devout husband or wife, devout children, devout workers, devout and faithful rulers, good government, good weather, peace, health, self-control, good reputation, good friends, faithful neighbors, and the like.

In other words, He gives us everything that we need for the care of both body and soul. His generosity knows no bounds.

Therefore, we sit down at the beginning of the year, the beginning of the month, or the beginning of the week and set aside a generous portion of God's daily bread for His work in the church. This is not done because He has commanded us so to do but rather because we, as His children by grace, want to emulate His generosity in our own lives. He is our Father; we are His children. And children want to be like their parents.

Total cost would be \$2,291.00 I'm going to take the van to another shop for a second opinion.
