FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK – DECEMBER 2021

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ:

When I was but a boy, I became a master at certain skills.

My childhood home was the typical example of the post-war boom tract housing. An Illinois cornfield became the suburban streets where I rode, ran, and played Kick the Can on humid summer nights—those nights before central air-conditioning drove us all inside to sit in front of a box that endlessly ran images of the outside. Before we became a nation of voyeurs, we would play outside hoping for the house to cool so we might find that restful sleep. Perhaps now softened by the gauzy veil of time, those days seem so innocent and blessed. After the games, we would sit on one of the many neighborhood stoops and just talk, and laugh, and talk some more. We learned how to converse. How to listen. We learned about each other, boys learning of girls, girls learning of boys. And the occasional steal of a kiss. All the places our lives would take us were merely lights on a distant horizon. For many of us, it was a horizon reached long ago. As we swam in the blessed river of youth, our voices were filled with the hope that health and the wealth of our blessed nation offered.

But none of those are things I ever mastered. The true skill of which I write would manifest once the weather turned cold. About this time of year, when the frost hit hard and we waited for the grayness of Fall to be blanketed by the first snow, we would find ourselves driven indoors. Indoors, yes, until the snow finally came and we played that long-awaited tackle football game in the snow-cushioned street.

My house was small. (Our beloved McMansions were yet to be dangled before us.) Three bedrooms and a poorly lit bathroom where we preened ourselves for the days at school. (My aged face now longs for that dimmer light.) We had a small finished basement. In one corner sat a much-used player piano (which is how I learned to sing). Another corner housed a small walled-off room. It was walled off to create mom's TINY sewing room. This small room had a few repurposed kitchen cabinets and was stuffed—floor to window-well—with the fabrics and batting Mom used in her many creations. It was the perfect room for a late fall game of hide-and-seek. It was probably during one of those games that my skill became evident. Buried under those bolts of fabric, as Christmas morning approached, I discovered the presents—my presents. From that moment on, I now had the secret knowledge. I knew where to look. I knew if my desires born from dog-eared toy catalogues were to be fulfilled. This odd curiosity—impatience—was the first part of the skill I mastered—and used—until the commercialism of Christmas morning finally killed my interest in such things.

The second part was born from the first. I now needed to master feigned surprise on Christmas morning. I don't know if my parents ever suspected that I knew what they did. To her credit, my first-born saintly, straight-A sister never cared to look. She didn't want to know what I knew. But I did, so each year I looked. So, on Christmas morning, I had to master—and did—the terrible skill of lying in the face of people I loved. Looking back, I see now the Holy Word's truth in my own life: "None is righteous, no, not one..." (Romans 3:10). It was probably not the first, but one of the starkest times, I would witness this ugly truth manifest in myself.

Of course, there were other times when other "skills" manifested themselves—as they did and do for you. But Christmas! To spoil, if only for myself, the gifts. That's what sin does—and often on a more destructive scale than a pre-teen boy finding where his parents hid things. Sin spoils so many things. So many precious gifts are ruined by our actions: family relationships, friendships, our own hopes—ripped open leaving us with the sad knowledge of what might have been if only we hadn't... Such is the result of spoiling the gifts. So the curse lives on: "...*but of the tree of the knowledge of good and evil you shall not eat, for in the day that you eat of it you shall surely die*" (Genesis 2:17). My Christmas mornings died a little when I found—and then looked at—those gifts. We die inside when we sin. Don't we? And then our flesh slowly catches up.

The joy of Christmas morning. Spoiled.

In a tangible way, my actions were my skipping Advent. Instead of the joy of receiving what I had desperately hoped for and could never earn or afford for myself, I had to carry the weight—the guilt—of a lie. I ruined, if just for myself, my family's Advent.

In the church at large, there is always pressure this time of year to skip Advent. Some churches don't even know that word. We, however, as Lutherans, are an anachronism. Think about that. In church we are not singing Christmas music, nor will we until just a few days before the actual feast. We will sing Advent hymns and read and ponder those sacred texts that tell us of the Gift to come. We will learn again of our forebears in the Faith as they

waited and looked for signs. We will hear John the Baptist as he prepares the way for our celebration of that most holy birth. And we will learn of ourselves. And then, as the world around us turns to "celebrate" Cupid, we will then sing Christmas hymns. And we will sing them only for the blink of twelve days. Yes, we indeed must seem backward to our community.

Advent remains a penitential season. This is probably why our culture eschews this holy season. Our culture seeks not repentance of but justification for its many sins and abominations. In Advent we hear of the necessity of the Christ as we face who we really are—lost and condemned people. And we see clearly and truly what love—Godly love—looks like. We see the sacrifice God made for us. "*Therefore, if anyone is in Christ, he is a new creation. The old has passed away; behold, the new has come. All this is from God, who through Christ reconciled us to himself*" (2 Corinthians 5:17-18). St. Paul writes these words reflecting that ancient truth. Even though we are the ones that break—repeatedly—the relationship with our God, it is He who comes to us to repair that relationship. He *reconciles* us—you—to Himself. In Christ we are restored. Made whole. Forgiven. What we spoil the Father re-wraps in the blood of His Son. This, this is why we give gifts. This is why my parents still worked to buy gifts for their conniving, oft disobedient and undeserving pre-teen son. It was because of the Gift.

And this is what Advent prepares us for. It prepares us to truly celebrate the great Feast of the Nativity. Advent reminds us of the fullness of time. It reminds us that those who came before us—those who walked this earth before that very first Christmas—had to wait. They waited for countless generations for that gift. And as Christmas came for them, after Advent it will still come for us.

But when the fullness of time had come, God sent forth his Son, born of woman, born under the law, to redeem those who were under the law, so that we might receive adoption as sons. And because you are sons, God has sent the Spirit of his Son into our hearts, crying, "Abba! Father!" So you are no longer a slave, but a son, and if a son, then an heir through God (Galatians 4:4-7).

I don't recall if I've ever confessed to my mother what I did when I was young. I suppose, knowing now more clearly what it means to be people of God, if I told her she would laugh. Maybe this year I will tell her. And, if I do, I suspect she will say this: "I knew!" And reflecting the love of Christ who died for her too, as she did for all those years, she will still give me gifts.

A blessed Advent and Nativity to each of you!



LCMS Stewardship Ministry Newsletter article - December 2021

Our Lord Jesus Christ, the great physician of both body and soul, healed a man with dropsy by His Word on the Sabbath (Luke 14:1–6). Dropsy is a paradoxical ailment, with an unquenchable craving for drink even though the body is over inflated with fluid, a craving that, when indulged, served not to ease but to feed the disease.

And so, if a man drinks a great deal but is never filled, he sees a doctor to inquire about what ails him, what is wrong with his body, and how to remedy it. For that is not thirst but a disease (Seneca, *Consolation to His Mother Helvia*, 11.3).

But if the owner of five couches goes looking for 10, or the owner of 10 tables buys up as many again, and even though he has plenty of land and money, he remains unsatisfied and desires yet more, losing sleep and always in discontent, does he not also require a physician to diagnose the cause of this distress?

For this is not want or lack, it's a disease (Aristippus, quoted in Plutarch, *Love of Wealth*, 524b). As St. Augustine of Hippo wrote, "we may rightly compare the dropsical man to a covetous rich man: For the more the one is swollen with excess of water, the more he thirsts; so also the other: The more he abounds in riches ... the more eagerly he desires them" (*The Sunday Sermons of the Great Fathers*, 4:135). Both require physicians. Both require diagnosis and medicine applied from the outside to the inward being. For these are not desires to be fulfilled but diseases to be cured.

This is why our Lord instructs us to not to be consumed by money. "No one can serve two masters ... You cannot serve God and money" (Matt. 6:24; Luke 16:13). Our desire for money, like the disease dropsy, is never satisfied. We always desire more. We think, "If I just had this much then I would be happy."

But even when that much comes, which God gladly gives, happiness evades us. The desire for more is never satisfied. It demands our constant energy, either in procuring more or protecting what we already have. When this happens, God, in His mercy, shows us that the money that He has given is no longer serving us, but we it. We have another master.

To overcome this, we need a physician's diagnosis and a physician's remedy. And our Lord Jesus Christ, our great physician of both body and soul, applies His Word to us as He did to the man healed of dropsy. He shows us how we have put our fear, love, and trust in our money and not feared, loved, and trusted in Him above all things.

In essence, He says, "Stop chasing after these fleeting things. They are vanity. They are the things that moth and rust destroy. You cannot have two masters. Repent!" And in seeing our great error, we are sorry that we have not fully feared, loved, and trusted in God above all things. And, in the mercy and

grace that He earned for us on the cross, He takes away this sin, restores us to health, and bids us to live.

But then what? What do we do with this healing balm and care that our great physician has given? Do we simply go back to our old ways? "By no means!" St. Paul says (Rom. 3:31; 6:2). We do not just go back to the old ways, the ways that lead us to death. No, we live a new life, a life filled with the grace, mercy and love of God toward us. And God's great mercy, grace, and love toward is so abundant that it overflows and pours out onto those around us.

So we no longer hoard money and possessions. We no longer scrape and crawl our way to amass more. We give to those around us, as God in Christ has given to us. We press our money and possessions into service for those who need it: our family, our society and our church. For money is God's gift to us to serve us and others. Not the other way around. It serves us because it is a gift from our Father in heaven.

This is how the birth of Jesus the Messiah came about: His mother Mary was pledged to be married to Joseph, but before they came together, she was found to be pregnant through the Holy Spirit. Because Joseph her husband was faithful to the law, and yet did not want to expose her to public disgrace, he had in mind to divorce her quietly. But after he had considered this, an angel of the Lord appeared to him in a dream and said, "Joseph son of David, do not be afraid to take Mary home as your wife, because what is conceived in her is from the Holy Spirit. She will give birth to a son, and you are to give him the name Jesus, because he will save his people from their sins." All this took place to fulfill what the Lord had said through the prophet: "The virgin will conceive and give birth to a son, and they will call him Immanuel" (which means "God with us"). When Joseph woke up, he did what the angel of the Lord had commanded him and took Mary home as his wife. (Matthew 1:18-24)

Have you ever been scared?

As a child, crossing the street without assistance, a car ran me over, breaking my right leg in two places. For two weeks I was hospitalized with my whole right leg, part of my left leg and my abdomen in casts. I went back home, but it wasn't easy for me not being able to move for a couple of weeks. Once they took the cast off, I was so scared. I thought, I was going to fall. Finally, one day I started walking, and my fears disappeared.

A story says that one man was walking and saw a huge bull blocking the way. Dead with fear, he prayed asking for the bull to leave, but he did not. A voice said to him: "Do what you need to do, but keep going". He filled his heart with bravery and decided to grab the bull by the horns, no matter what. Courageously, he confronted the bull.

You won't believe what happened. The bull spoke to him: "Why did you take so long to come to me? Were you scared? I've been waiting for you so that I might take you with me. Hop on my back, and tell me where you wish to go".

Joseph, too, was in a dilemma; He didn't know what do with the pregnant Mary. In dreams he heard these words: *'Joseph, do not be afraid to take Mary home as your wife...*" What seemed like a problem turned out to be a blessing. Courage to find the blessing, and overcome the fear is what we need.

The Lord gives words of security to all who belong to Him: "Do not be afraid". These words were heard by Abraham, David, Zechariah, Peter, Mary Magdalene, Mary and Joseph and many others. Today, God says to us: "Do not be afraid", even though we have many reasons to be scared, such as flying on a plane, facing terrorism, losing a job, facing illness or even death.



Though fear is natural, and we have to deal with it, let us not forget that God has control of all, including our fears. Christmas is near; where we always remember that everything has a significant meaning. Celebrate Christmas! Celebrate Immanuel! Celebrate God with us! Celebrate that He brings to us His peace and salvation!
