## *FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK – AUGUST 2022*



Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ:

So, just a few days before the calendar flipped to July, a historic decision was handed down by the Supreme Court. Unfortunately, the July newsletter had already gone to press, so no mention was made of it. It's now been a few weeks, and perhaps the reality of the decision has come to light.

Before I go any further, let me say this, and let me say it unequivocally: The Church, from day one, has stood against abortion, as it has against many of the social issues our culture now embraces. If you support abortion, you are not standing with the Church nor the Word of God. If this is you, our Lord commands you to repent. And I, as a called and ordained servant of the Word, also beg you to repent.

Back to the Supreme Court... What the recent Dobbs decision did *not* do was abolish abortion. What it did do was point out that the 1973 decision, known as *Roe v. Wade*, was not constitutional. Simply put, the 1973 Court created a law establishing a constitutional right to abortion<sup>1</sup> The authority to make laws is an authority granted by the U.S. Constitution, not to the courts, but to the legislature. What the 1973 Court did was identified, almost immediately, as just that—the Supreme Court acting as the legislative body of the Government. When the decision was made in 1973, many legal scholars also recognized that the *Roe v. Wade* decision was on a collision course with the Constitution. This was also the opinion of the late Justice Ruth Bader Ginsburg. Her criticisms of *Roe v. Wade*, even as a staunch advocate *for* abortion, are well known. It took almost fifty years, but the *Roe v. Wade* collision with the Constitution finally occurred under the Roberts Court and the resulting Dobbs decision. So, what the Supreme Court did in the Dobbs decision was to act regarding the Court's 1973 decision and return

(remand) the issue of abortion to the states, to be deliberated in accordance with the Constitution. The issue will now be decided by the people through our elected state representatives.

If, like me, you live in the State of Illinois, you should know that abortion is still very legal in our state. In fact, Illinois now is advertising itself (along with California and New York—misery loves company) as “an abortion sanctuary.” Think about that word “sanctuary.” It is derived from the Latin word *sanctus*. This is a translation of the Greek word “hagios” (ἅγιος) and the Hebrew word “kadosh” (קדוש). We translate it as “holy.” Holy reflects the concept of God as completely “other.” He is other than us. He is God. He alone is Holy. We, as His people, are called to reflect His holiness in our lives. We are to be something “other” than what the fallen world would have us be. So, a sanctuary is a holy place. That is why we call the interior of our church, Immanuel, a sanctuary. It is a holy place where the Lord, the Holy God, comes to be among and bless His people. Do you see what evil does? It hijacks our words and symbols and attaches to them a meaning antithetical to what God reveals and what His people know to be the godly meaning and intention of those words and symbols—hence the new meanings attached also to the rainbow and to the word “love.” In that sense, Illinois would like to be known and advertises itself as a “holy” place where a child can be put to death. That is what evil does. It takes the abhorrent and paints it as good. It takes what is good and recasts it as evil. It is a picture of the evil powers and principalities working among us.

Now that the opportunity to argue and influence has been returned to us, we need to prepare to do just that. Truly, we should have been doing this all along. I suppose it has been too easy to throw up our hands. It has been too easy to look at the government and repeat the mantra: “It’s settled law.” This spills over into other aspects of our life in the Church as well. Think about evangelism. We have relegated evangelism to, at worst, the pastor alone, or, only slightly better, a committee. We have relieved ourselves of individual responsibility. Wouldn’t you agree that the most important and fruitful evangelism occurs at our kitchen tables and in those frequent conversations with our neighbors? Too often we remain sitting on our hands waiting for others to do the work intended for each of us. We have been given our intellect, abilities, and vocations to be used in service of our Lord and in service to our neighbor. And is there anything more important than life?

So yes, we need to be ready to argue. And don’t confuse arguing with quarrelling. Arguing, in its classic sense, means to use reason to persuade. It is usually quite a calm (yet still important) thing to argue in the classic sense. Quarrelling, by contrast, is akin to complaining. It is an airing of grievances with no goal in sight. It results in us not reasoning but rather screeching at each other in the public square—both the literal square and the figurative square of social media.

So how can we begin to prepare for the arguments to come? Did you know that *The Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod* provides a host of resources covering abortion and other topics? I will provide a link and a list of some of the titles in a note below. I encourage you to look these over and educate yourself on these issues.<sup>2</sup> I encourage you to be prepared.

Remember, even though they often do not know or do not think they need it, your neighbor (spouse, children, extended family, next-door neighbors, co-workers, and community) need the truth you carry within you. Christ is their only hope.

*Now who is there to harm you if you are zealous for what is good? But even if you should suffer for righteousness’ sake, you will be blessed. Have no fear of them, nor be troubled, but in your hearts honor Christ the Lord as holy, always being prepared to make a defense to anyone who asks you for a reason for the hope that is in you; yet do it with gentleness and respect, having a good conscience, so that, when you are slandered, those who revile your good behavior in Christ may be put to shame. For it is better to suffer for doing good, if that should be God’s will, than for doing evil (1 Peter 3:13-17).*

Thankfully, finally, the “battle” is engaged here, in our towns, in our state. And we have an opportunity to use our voices as God gives us the ability. Pray for wisdom and strength, that God’s will be done among us and that we would remain faithful in these dark and latter days. To quote my younger friends, “It’s so on!” Indeed, it is.

## The Ceremony of the Offertory

Have you ever noticed the subtle ceremony involved in receiving the offerings during the Divine Service? After all the offerings have been collected, they are brought forward and given to the pastor or one of his assistants. The pastor then turns toward the altar, and as he slightly bows his head, the collection plates with the offerings in them are raised slightly to the Lord and then placed either on the altar or a table for the offerings. Why do we do have this ceremony? And what does it teach us? For that is what ceremony does; it teaches, as the Augsburg Confession tells us, what we need to know about Christ (AC XXIV, 1–3).

Originally, this ceremony included more than simply bringing forward what was collected in the offering plates. The elements for the Holy Communion—the bread and the wine—were brought forward along with the offering plates. As the offering plates and the elements were lifted toward the Lord, and placed upon the altar, the elements would be put in the center and the altar, now made a table, would be set for the Lord's Supper.

These gifts brought to the altar came from the sweat of the people's brow. It is the bread and wine, the fruits of the peoples' labor in this fallen world. After six days of labor and toil, the people would bring a generous proportion for the Lord's work. It was set upon the altar and offered to the Lord for Him to take up and press into His service for His gracious work in and among them.

For what they offered to the Lord from the sweat of their brow, the bread of anxious toil, came back to them as the bread of life, the bread come down from heaven that whoever eats this bread and drinks this cup would receive life through the forgiveness of their sins.

This is not unlike what the Lord did for His people in the Old Testament:

You shall tithe all the yield of your seed that comes from the field year by year. And before the Lord your God, in the place that he will choose, to make his name dwell there, you shall eat the tithe of your grain, of your wine, and of your oil, and the firstborn of your herd and flock, that you may learn to fear the Lord your God always. And if the way is too long for you, so that you are not able to carry the tithe, when the Lord your God blesses you, because the place is too far from you, which the Lord your God chooses, to set his name there, then you shall turn it into money and bind up the money in your hand and go to the place that the Lord your God chooses and spend the money for whatever you desire—oxen or sheep or wine or strong drink, whatever your appetite craves. And you shall eat there before the Lord your God and rejoice, you and your household.

What a blessing! God provides for us in all things. He provides bread from the sweat of our brows, and He receives this from us in the first fruits offerings we give to Him in thanksgiving and praise. He receives and turns it into spiritual bread, heavenly bread, the bread of eternal life and gives it back to us so that we might have joy. So, the next time you are in the Divine Service, watch this ceremony in wonder, that the Lord gives back to us, what we have given to Him so that we may rejoice in the salvation He has won upon the cross and gives to us in His supper.

During one of my chaplain duty days, I had the opportunity to meet a young patient. He thought that I was one of the hospital doctors. He told me his serious abdominal health troubles. He was in pain and bleeding. It was his second time in the hospital in less than two weeks. His doctors didn't know what was causing his bleeding. He looked tired, and very anxious. He thought that he was going to die. Finally, I introduced myself as a volunteer chaplain and offered to pray. He started to cry and said that his life was full of sin. He had offended God and his neighbor. "I have lived a life of continuous sin. Will God truly forgive me?" he asked. He was not sure that he was able to receive God's forgiveness. He was deeply repentant. I shared the Gospel of love and salvation offered in Christ Jesus with him. The next day I returned to visit him, but the room was empty. I'm certain that God has forgiven his sins and that Jesus will be with him always, in this world and in eternal life.

Will God truly forgive me? Perhaps at times we ask ourselves this question. Doubt is sown by the devil, but God's answer is always clear, faithful, and confident: *"though your sins be as scarlet, they shall be as white as snow; though they be red like crimson, they shall be as wool"* Isaiah 1:18

I continue to visit and phone church families and contacts. I am well received, and I pray with them before I leave the residence. Some families assure me that they are going to come to worship, but then they don't.
