FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK - FEBRUARY 2023



Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ:

Very recently, the daily lectionary directed me to this passage from Ezekiel:

So you, son of man, I have made a watchman for the house of Israel. Whenever you hear a word from my mouth, you shall give them warning from me. If I say to the wicked, O wicked one, you shall surely die, and you do not speak to warn the wicked to turn from his way, that wicked person shall die in his iniquity, but his blood I will require at your hand. But if you warn the wicked to turn from his way, and he does not turn from his way, that person shall die in his iniquity, but you will have delivered your soul (Ezekiel 33:7-9).

This keeps me up at night. As does this: "Obey your leaders and submit to them, for they are keeping watch over your souls, as those who will have to give an account. Let them do this with joy and not with groaning, for that would be of no advantage to you" Hebrews 13:17.

These texts are often read at ordinations. They are stark reminders to the man being ordained (as they are to me) of exactly what work the pastor is to do. And for that work the pastor is accountable to God. Maybe this explains why I'm grouchy at times! You see, pastors have a very specific job. And that job is to protect you. He is (I am) here to protect you from Satan and from yourself.

First, let's talk about Satan. He hates everything about what happens in our church and the fruit that the church brings forth in your lives. He seeks to destroy the church and her offspring, as Revelation tells us: "Then the dragon became furious with the woman and went off to make war on the rest of her offspring, on those who keep the commandments of God and hold to the testimony of Jesus" (Revelation 12:17). The woman is the church, and her offspring are you and me. Satan, as a fallen angel, has been around for a

very long time. He and his demons are not God; they are not omniscient and omnipotent, but they are knowledgeable about you, me, and our weaknesses—and how to exploit them. And they are powerful. I think this is one of the reasons that peace in the church is so fleeting. We are constantly under attack in one way or another. One of my jobs as pastor is to be aware of that—to try to discern how it is the evil one might be attempting to get a foothold inside the door. This is one of the reasons men like me, and churches like ours, are so slow to change anything. We are constantly praying and trying to discern how even little changes might affect future generations. And we are painfully aware that change, even divisive and destructive change, is very difficult to undo.

Ponder that for a moment. Think about something that has changed in the church since you were a child. Has that change resulted in a difference in the way the Gospel is taught and perceived? How Christ is taught and perceived? I have taught how the removal of a comma from an influential translation of Scripture in the last century has led, in no small part, to the "I'm spiritual but not religious" crowd (aka the "I don't need to go to church and hear from the one called to teach" crowd).¹

Sometimes, it seems they are small and innocuous things that pastors say no to. But think about it from the pastor's perspective. How can we see the long-term effects of what appears to be nothing to us? I hope you can begin to see our hesitancy. And you, dear laity, have the duty and responsibility to do the same when I propose a change. At a minimum, you should expect me to have discussed the matter with the other pastors in the circuit. There is a reason we, pastors, are required to meet every month: to be accountable to and to benefit from the wisdom of our peers. The Lord gives us this warning through St. Peter:

"Be sober-minded; be watchful. Your adversary the devil prowls around like a roaring lion, seeking someone to devour. Resist him, firm in your faith, knowing that the same kinds of suffering are being experienced by your brotherhood throughout the world" (1 Peter 5:8-9).

Now, let's talk about you. Very quickly pastors realize there are many voices competing for their people's attention. Some are good. Some are bad. Some are evil. One thing we need to recognize right out of the box is that we are still under that curse of Satan. Those words he spoke to Eve and Adam still lurk in our minds: "*Did God actually say*…" (Genesis 3:1). And remember the false promise he added to that: "…*your eyes will be opened, and you will be like God, knowing good and evil*" (Genesis 3:5). We must realize that when I speak to you as your pastor, your sinful inclination (going all the way back to Eve) is to, in god-like fashion, avow or disavow what I am saying. Now that's not all bad. And the Lord uses that skepticism by urging you to search His Word and see if the pastor is indeed speaking the Truth to you. This is one of the tools He gives you to discern false preachers in your midst. Do you do that? When I say something you don't like, do you go and check the Word and the context? Or do you simply disavow the Word you find unpalatable? Of course, if you do go and check, and you find I have not misspoken or falsely taught, you then realize the problem is with you. You can see our hesitancy to the truth. It's our "default" way of thinking as fallen creatures. We want to believe what we want. And, unless we study, we can easily find mouths to whisper in our ears whatever we wish to believe. St. Paul warns Timothy of this:

¹ Here are two translations of Ephesians 4:11-12. The underlined portion is that which I desire to highlight. The first is from the ESV (published in 2001 and based heavily on the RSV published in 1971): "*And he gave the apostles, the prophets, the evangelists, the shepherds and teachers, to equip the saints for the work of ministry, for building up the body of Christ…*"

Now here's the KJV (published in 1611) of the same text: "And he gave some, apostles; and some, prophets; and some, evangelists; and some, pastors and teachers; For the perfecting of the saints, for the work of the ministry, for the edifying of the body of Christ..." Do you see how the modern translation has omitted a comma? And do you see how this omission changes the meaning of the phrase? Granted, the original Greek lacks punctuation. However, the context of Ephesians 4 makes it clear that what is being described are the various tasks required of the offices Christ gives to His church. These offices described in Ephesians do the work of the ministry, not the people. In the twentieth century, a strong anti-cleric sentiment grew in the church-at-large which led to the deletion of the comma. Such a small thing has led to so many troublesome issues in the church-at-large. Please feel free to ask me if you would like to learn more on this.

For the time is coming when people will not endure sound teaching, but having itching ears they will accumulate for themselves teachers to suit their own passions, and will turn away from listening to the truth and wander off into myths. As for you, always be sober-minded, endure suffering, do the work of an evangelist, fulfill your ministry (2 Timothy 4:3-5).

As the Lord commanded Ezekiel, so I too must warn you of those things. I have to remind you (and myself) of the forces—sometimes within our own hearts—that seek to lead us away from Christ. Remember, that's the goal of Satan and our own sinful hearts. And yes, that can make me seem grumpy. But as your parents once told you: It's for your own good.

And it is exactly what my ordination requires me to do.

Don't Replace "And" with "Or"

We've all heard that stewardship means giving to the church of our time, talents and treasure. This alliterative trinity helps us see that giving is not just about money, but about our whole lives. As we confess in the Small Catechism's explanation of the First Article of the Apostle's Creed, God gives us everything we have and enjoy. First we confess that God gives us "our body and soul, our eyes, ears, and all our members, our reason and all our senses" (SC II). Then we confess that He gives us material things. The time, talents, and treasure trinity places before our eyes the fact that we are to give something of all three of these things toward the mission of the church in thanksgiving for what God has provided. For everything we have, and indeed, everything we are, comes from God's fatherly, divine goodness and mercy.

The problem with this alliterative trinity comes when we replace one little word with another little word — when we replace the word and with the word or. It is always written with the and, but when we read it, we read it with the or. Thus this quite helpful trinity, which extolls that everything that we have and are is a gift from God, to be given back in service of His church, turns into a trinity that we can pick and choose from when we serve God. The giving of our time, talents and treasure turns into the giving of our time, talents or treasure.

Then the question arises: Can we give of our time and talents instead of our treasure? Or perhaps it is the other way round: Can we give of our treasure and not of our time and talents? But these are the wrong questions. The right question is, can we give of our time and talents in addition to our treasure? Yes, indeed, we are called to give of all three. The things that God gives us are not to be pitted against one another. Rather, they are given to us, and we are to press them all into God's service for benefit of His church and our neighbors in need.

Thus, we give all three. We give our treasure in the form of a generous, first-fruits proportion of our income. We give of our time in generosity for the benefit of Christ's holy church. We give of our talents in the same manner. Since God gave us all these things, we are called to give generously of all these things in faith toward Him and in fervent love to our neighbors.

For God has provided all these things for us. Out of His fatherly, divine goodness and mercy, He gives us each time, talents AND treasure as a means to bless those around us. We serve our neighbors with these things, blessing them with the blessings with which God has blessed us. We give of our time, talents and treasure to our families, our society, our church and our local congregations. And we do this because we know that we are not our own. Rather, we belong to God. We have been bought with a price: the holy, precious blood and innocent suffering and death of our Lord Jesus Christ. He gave everything -----His time, His talents and His treasure — to have us as His own and to live under Him in His kingdom and serve Him in everlasting righteousness, innocence and blessedness. We have these things as gifts and blessings from God.

Let us then press them all into service for the sake of His love — time, talents and treasure together.

of this Hispanic ministry!


