### FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK - MARCH 2023



Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ:

The years of our life are seventy,
or even by reason of strength eighty;
yet their span is but toil and trouble;
they are soon gone, and we fly away.
Who considers the power of your anger,
and your wrath according to the fear of you?
So teach us to number our days
that we may get a heart of wisdom (Psalm 90:10-12).

Why am I here? Yes, it's a deep and, perhaps, weird question. I assure you I'm not wandering into a discussion of existentialism. Cue the yawn. What I want you to think about is this: What do I do as a pastor—your pastor? What is, essentially, my vocation as I stand before you each Sunday?

We'll come back to this in a bit.

Many years ago, while serving the church in Michigan, I was also a chaplain at a Lutheran nursing home. It had just over one hundred beds. I was there to share the love of Christ with everyone, but especially with those who had no

connection with the Christian Church. As part of my duties there, I also planned and presided at a memorial service held each quarter. Every twelve weeks, the residents, the families of those lost, the staff, and I would gather in the chapel to be reminded of God's promises in Christ. Remarkable it was that the number of names read at each memorial service was about the same: fifteen, with more names added in winter as we were reminded of the terrible toll the flu season exacted that past fall. You can do the math.

Each week at that nursing home, I also had the pleasant task of organizing the Friday afternoon Lutheran Vespers. Usually, I would preside and preach at one of these services each month. The others were assigned to fellow pastors or vicars who volunteered to assist in bringing Christ to these people. One particular Friday, we gathered in that little stone and stained-glass chapel, complete with altar and organ (the little pews had long ago been removed to allow the necessary room for wheelchairs). I was observing a vicar from a sister parish leading the service and preaching on a reading from Hebrews. This poor young man (I say poor as he was about to experience my ire), with many words, was exhorting the residents to try a little harder and work more to make the Lord happy and win souls for Christ. Remember the math I asked you to do above. That math gives you the reason for my ire. More likely than not, at least one of those souls seated in one of those wheelchairs would be called from this life before the following Friday dawned. It was, perhaps, the last time they would hear the Word of God proclaimed to them. A point I made certain the preacher, and his supervisor, understood. Missing from the sermon was any pronouncement of forgiveness, justification, and the promise of eternal life in Christ.

Of course, that reminded me of my own training and a similar episode when my \*ahem\* backside was handed to me. I went into a hospital room and proceeded to talk to a person—a person who had only hours to live—about the nice weather outside. (Why is it that we revert to superficial small talk in such times? Is it because we've forgotten how, or have become afraid, to speak what needs to be spoken?) Future pastor speaks of weather to dying woman. It's almost comical it's so ridiculously tragic. I thank God my supervisor—a wonderful role-model, teacher, and man of God—was there to clean up the mess I made. And I thank God that he also used my mess as a profound teaching moment. The lesson I learned? Simple:

Don't waste a dying man's time.

And there's a second lesson too: We are all that dying man.<sup>1</sup>

I pray, fervently pray, each week before I ascend into that frightful pulpit, that the Lord would bless me with His Spirit, His words, that I might not make a mess of things. I pray that as I stand in that pulpit, surrounded by so many physical and flesh-and-blood reminders of those who came before me, that I would resolve to know nothing among us but Christ and Him crucified.<sup>2</sup> More than anything else in our short lives, this is what we need. We need the Christ crucified for our sin—the cause of our death—and risen for our life. We need to hear of that forgiveness and

promise of life that He graciously and freely showers upon us. We need to hear of the promise that death's dread word is not final. Christ is the final word. And He has conquered death.

Who knows what tomorrow will bring? Maybe good things. Maybe bad news and disappointment. Maybe very bad news that carries with it the reality of our own mortality.

Don't waste a dying man's time.

How well do you know the people sitting around you as we gather each Sunday? Our modern lives are so compartmentalized and lived in such self-imposed isolation. What do we really know about the lives of those brought to that one place each Sunday? Maybe some great sin, their own or those close to them, has rocked their lives. Maybe they are struggling with addiction. Maybe they must return, after receiving the Good News and gifts of our Lord and hearing the joyous hymns we sing together, to a home, a life, filled with the darkness of abuse and neglect. And maybe they are dying. Only the Lord knows which one of us will be taken in the weeks and months ahead.

When you think of these things, about what you *don't* know about your neighbor's life and what profound issues might be confronting them, sermons and teachings of your best life now, pseudo-pop psychology, and how to try harder and do better; these seem grossly out of place. Don't they? Imagine sitting there in deep emotional, physical, or spiritual pain, and then hearing me preach about the steps you need to take to have a better life—to be more blessed! Or image me accusing you of not smiling and being happy enough. (Sadly, these two examples I have heard from Lutheran pulpits!) And I'm quite certain that we've all had those experiences when, upon burying someone we love, we see the world paying no attention and laughing at the trite things it typically finds amusing. It hits us as great blasphemy. Now, imagine that happening in church.

Don't waste a dying man's time. And remember, we are all dying.

Years ago now, not long after our Lord called me here, I was visiting a member at one of our local assisted living facilities. After the visit, while walking to my car, a man approached me (I, as always, was arrayed in my clericals—a visual reminder for myself and those around me of what I represent and what I am called to do). The man asked if I would be willing to visit his father. His father had lost everything to the sin of substance abuse. The man had lost his wife, his ability to work, and now his health. He had nothing. So, of course, I visited the man. It was one of those moments that, looking back, I can say was arranged by our Lord. So, I visited. I visited carrying the gift of Christ with me—something we all do as Christians. After hearing the man's long, sad story, I had nothing to say or give except the words of Christ. The Word of forgiveness. The Word of Life. And truly, what else was needed? What else, in those moments, could be more important than that? After several more visits, the man said something to me that, obviously, remains with me to this day. He said to me: "You've done more for me than you know and more than I could have ever hoped for." That, my brothers and sisters, is the power of the Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ. After those few visits, I never saw him again. We were parted by death as the living inevitably are.

Don't waste a dying man's time.

That, my dear friends in Christ, is my job. That is why I, as those who came before me, am here. I am here to proclaim Christ and Him crucified. I am here to prepare you, and myself, for that moment we take our last breath in

this life.

Once again, we find ourselves in the holy season of Lent. And soon, as Lent draws to a close, on Good Friday

we will sing that great hymn written by Bernard of Clairvaux (d. 1153). The hymn, O Sacred Head, Now Wounded (LSB

450), has as its last stanza these words:

Be Thou my consolation,

My shield, when I must die;

Remind me of thy passion

When my last hour draws nigh.

Mine eyes shall then behold Thee,

Upon Thy cross shall dwell,

My heart by faith enfold Thee,

Who dieth thus dies well.

That is why I'm here. That is why we gather every Sunday.

Don't waste a dying man's time. And we are all dying.

But in the cross of Christ, we die well.

Lenten Discipline: Denying the Self

We are at the beginning of Lent. During the Lenten season, the church calls to our attention the sufficiency of what God gives. It points to the sufficiency of God's grace in the atoning work of Jesus. It shows us the sufficiency of faith in Jesus' work for us. It makes known the sufficiency of God's Word in faith and life.

But Lent doesn't just remind us of the sufficiency of God's spiritual gifts — the gifts that pertain to our redemption and salvation. Lent also reminds us of the sufficiency of the physical, temporal gifts of God which pertain to this body and life. In other words, it reminds us of the importance of godly contentment and of outward discipline and training of the body.

This outward training of the body teaches us not to give in to every desire of our flesh, but to learn to say no to them. And it does this in such a way that if you fail, it is no sin. It is a way to practice without putting yourself into a compromising situation.

Fasting is a good example of this outward training. When you fast, you are practicing saying no to the desires of your body. But if you fail in this, if you break your fast, you have not sinned. But you have learned something about how your flesh works, how difficult it is to fight against it, and how you need help from above to discipline the desires of your body.

Another example is almsgiving. An increase in giving to the church and its mission during Lent is also a form of outward training. We all know that our flesh finds security in money and stuff. By committing to give more to the church, you are training your flesh. You are, by this outward discipline, training yourself to be content with what God gives. You are practicing saying "no" to your desires. Again, if you fail, you have not sinned. But you've learned just how powerful your flesh is — it leads you instead of you leading it. You've learned how you need help from above in being content with what God gives.

This is why St. Paul instructs young Pastor Timothy in this way:

But godliness with contentment is great gain, for we brought nothing into the world, and we cannot take anything out of the world. But if we have food and clothing, with these we will be content. But those who desire to be rich fall into temptation, into a snare, into many senseless and harmful desires that plunge people into ruin and destruction. For the love of money is a root of all kinds of evils. It is through this craving that some have wandered away from the faith and pierced themselves with many pangs. (1 Tim. 6:6–10)

Our sufficiency is not of ourselves; it is in God. Let us learn this without sin by training our flesh this Lenten season.

#### Lent.

Lent begins on Ash Wednesday. On this day, as forgiven sinners, we receive ashes in the sign of a cross on our foreheads as the pastor says: "for dust you are and to dust you will return." (Genesis 3:19)



Do you ponder Jesus' sacrifice and death during Lent? We can imagine that Jesus knew His mission to save the human race was drawing closer and closer. He can see the punishment, suffering, and death He will experience. It was not easy for Him, but He willingly obeyed His Heavenly Father. He spent time in meditation and prayer for this imminent event.

Usually when we talk about death, people, even Christians, become frightened. It's not easy when your doctor tells you bad news like "you have diabetes, cancer, heart disease, etc." It's not easy to assimilate. How long will I live? Will I suffer a lot? These are just a few questions that come into our minds. It is not easy for us to deal with the fact that someday we will leave this world. It takes time for reflection.

To us, as a Christians, Lent is a time of spiritual preparation and prayer. In this season, we need to look, in a seriously and respectful way, at the act of Christ's sacrifice for us on the cross. We need to realize that it is our sins that nailed Him to the cross. It is a penitential season of the church year. He hangs there suffering on our behalf. And He does it all out of love for us miserable sinners. And we also pray to God asking Him to help us accept our own inevitable death trusting that He will deliver our souls into His presence where we will await with hope our resurrection on the Last Day.

Realizing all that Jesus has done for us we can sing or say the words of this beautiful Lenten hymn:

Christ the life of all the living,

Christ the death of death our foe,

Christ Yourself for me once giving

To the darkest depths of woe

Through Your suffering, death and merit

Life eternal I inherit.

Thousand, thousand thanks are due,

Dearest Jesus unto You. Amen and Amen!

Please join us for the Lutheran Early Response Team volunteer training program. Together we will walk through a simple training program designed to help you serve as a trained Christian volunteer when a disaster strikes and to help your family and congregation to be prepared for disasters. This training is part of a Synodwide disaster response program, facilitated by a network of District Disaster Response Coordinators and Teams, under the direction of LCMS Disaster Response. After the program, you will receive a completion card credential and a T-shirt.

PLEASE NOTE: Registrations must be received by two weeks prior to the training day to ensure a shirt at the time of the class photo. Registrations received after that date will have shirts sent with the credential card.

In the chaos of disaster, it's important to stay focused on the task at hand. This training will help you focus on the most important thing to remember as you prepare for or to respond to a disaster in your community or beyond. At the center of our LERT Volunteer training is one thing: MERCY! Christ's mercy is the basis for everything we say and do. This 6-hour training event will equip you to be an effective volunteer should a disaster strike your community. After a brief introduction regarding the goals and theological rationale of LCM Disaster Response, the LERT volunteer training will address the following:

- Christian care in times of disaster
- A Ministry of presence
- The LERT Program and how it works with other responders
- Introduction to Disaster Response
- At the work site: Debris clean up, tarp and patch, flood and mud clean up, chainsaw safety, and necessary paperwork.

Cost for the day is \$35, which includes light breakfast, lunch, book/materials, t-shirt, and credential card. If you are repeating the session we ask that you contribute \$15 if you need a new book and t-shirt to help defray the costs.
