FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK - APRIL 2023



Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ:

Stuck. That, I suspect, is how many of us feel a lot of the time. Stuck. Same ol' town. Same ol' streets. Same ol' people in our lives. Same ol' problems. From where we sit, it seems the view never changes. Those dreams we had when we fretted over our hair (and that's *ancient* history for me) and searched frantically through the laundry piles for our favorite pair of jeans have long since evaporated. Some of us may have held to those dreams for years, or even decades. But something happens as the calendar pages relentlessly fall to the floor. Too soon, it seems, we see the days in front of us are not so many. Time runs short. Dreams fade. Plans fall. Days flow, one into the other, with no noteworthy demarcation to remember their passing. And life continues towards its always-approaching end marked so soon only by a stone and a name. A name, whatever accomplishments to which it might be attached, that will soon be forgotten.

It was about two years ago that the very good movie *Belfast* was released. It's an autobiographical delight produced by and about the childhood of the gifted actor Kenneth Branagh. In the movie, his grandmother is portrayed by the equally talented Judi Dench. In one memorable scene, Buddy (the young Kenneth Branagh who already has a love for the silver screen) and his Grannie are sharing their love for the picture shows. As they are for us today, the picture shows were a means of escape. Grannie shares that in her younger days she thought she could crawl right into those theater screens and visit all those fantastic places. She mentions the movie *Lost Horizon* in which the protagonists stumble across the Edenic valley of Shangri-la. It's funny how the name Shangri-la is now such a part of our cultural literacy that, know we not the tale, we carry within each bosom a vision—a hope—of Shangri-la. After hearing her recollection, Buddy—as only a child could—asks Grannie if she has ever been to Shangri-la. Her answer? I think it's

one of the small but pivotal lines in the film. She states: "There are no roads to Shangri-la from our part of Belfast." Looking back over her life, any dream of escaping her working-class life had long since evaporated.

Aren't you and I the same? I recall the first time, as a very young boy, I saw *The Wizard of Oz.* Such a fantastic place. Who could watch and not dream of conversing with the Scarecrow or seeing a horse of another color? And later, the Emerald City would be eclipsed by the universe of *Star Wars*. And for the younger generations among us today, that imaginary escape is the world of *Harry Potter*. It is often startling how much power a motion picture can have as we sit transfixed by those images of far-off and oft magical places. And then we leave the theater. And the reality of our lives confronts us before we exit the parking lot. It confronts us as we jockey to hit the streets before the people we just spent two hours sitting next to captivated by those imaginary visions. And there we find ourselves stuck in traffic. Stuck.

Too often, we Christians go hunting for those elusive "mountain top" experiences—those escapes. Those are the experiences that capture our minds, and especially our emotions, much like those projected images. Somehow, the perceived "stuckness" of our lives seems less noble, less godly. And that, my brothers and sisters, is the lie.

First, for those of you whose lives have been rocked by some great trauma—a lost spouse, a wayward child, illness, or death, what is it you long for in those times? You long for your life to just return to the way it was. You long for the moment when you didn't know, when the life in which you grumbled about boredom held little more than daily work, quiet nights, occasional laughter with a few other stuck friends. In the midst of trauma—whatever the cause—your great hope is to return to the "Eden" of your life before. The life in which you felt so stuck suddenly seems beautiful. But it seems there are no roads to Shangri-la for you either. You can only go forward facing what now awaits you with each dawn.

Second, make no mistake, our Lord is working through you, dear Christian, as you face each mundane day. Ask yourself where our communities would be without people who did the simple but all-too-important work of rising each day to go to work, to raise their children, and to look after their neighbors—the lives in which most of us seem stuck. We witness too many of our neighbors, our children, and maybe ourselves, abandoning our posts—our callings—to seek that non-existent Shangri-la.

The Lord, of course, knows our restlessness.

One of the five great scrolls (known as the *megillot*),² Ecclesiastes was read to God's people on the Feast of Booths (also called "Tabernacles"). It is a feast that features prominently in the Gospel according to John. That particular feast commemorates the Exodus when the Lord's people lived in tents and were provided for by God. They had to rely on God for forty years as they wandered through the desert. You might say they were stuck. Think about the following words in that context:

He has made everything beautiful in its time. Also, he has put eternity into man's heart, yet so that he cannot find out what God has done from the beginning to the end. I perceived that there is nothing better for them than to be joyful and to do good as long as they live; also that everyone should eat and drink and take pleasure in all his toil—this is God's gift to man (Ecclesiastes 3:11-13).

Have you ever thought about your rather ordinary and mundane life in this way? That it is God's gift? And the toil you endure every day is not just a gift for you. In that toil you are a gift to your neighbors. God is, in a sense, hidden in you. He is working through you (and too often, in spite of you) to accomplish His good and gracious will. And do you catch that beautiful little nugget? He has put eternity in your heart.

I am always just a little disappointed on Easter Sunday. During Holy Week we attend so many beautiful and ornate services that we only celebrate once each year. We have special music and long readings immersing ourselves deeply into the story of God's love for His people—our story. We have candles and ornate, ancient services. And then, Easter morning it is more or less business as usual. It seems there should be the greatest fanfare on that day. But it's just what we do every Sunday. Even in my *slight* disappointment, there is a great beauty and a great theological significance to that "business as usual." You see, each and every Sunday we celebrate Easter. We are pointed to the font where we were united with Christ's death and resurrection. We partake of that same resurrected Body and Blood, nourished and strengthened by that Most Holy Food.

Regardless of what we feel, regardless of how boring our lives may seem, regardless of how stuck we may perceive ourselves, we are God's people. We are people who know that our lives are now hidden in Christ. Our simple, yet beautiful lives are now filled with purpose as we look to our neighbors with the eyes of Christ. Our lives are filled with joy, peace, and hope as we look forward to what we will be—where we will soon be. Remember, we are sojourners here, living in these mortal tents. Yet we aren't stuck. Are we? No, there is a road out from our little hovels. That road, that Way, is the Church. In Christ's church, week after week, year after year, we are being led home.

If then you have been raised with Christ, seek the things that are above, where Christ is, seated at the right hand of God. Set your minds on things that are above, not on things that are on earth. For you have died, and your life is hidden with Christ in God. When Christ who is your life appears, then you also will appear with him in glory (Colossians 3:1-4).

Christ is risen.

He is risen, indeed! Halleluiah!

A Better Way

The most common question about stewardship is not *whether* a Christian should give to their church. Of course Christians should give to their church. Everyone knows this. Rather, the question asked most is, "How much should I give?" But this question really means, "Should Christians give a tenth of their income to their local congregation?"

Here are some common reasons against tithing. Some say tithing isn't necessary because it isn't expressly commanded in the New Testament. There is no "Thus saith the Lord," or "should" concerning tithing. Others say that Christians give to their congregation in ways much broader than money. They give of their time and their talents, and these together with treasures (money) add up to more than a tithe. Still others say that they give of their treasures to other things besides their congregation, and they want to support those things alongside their church. And then there are those who think Christians shouldn't tithe because of some fear. They are afraid that if they tithe, their gift will be misused, or that after tithing, there won't be enough left over to get the things that they use, want or need.

Here are some reasons why Christians *should* tithe. Even though the New Testament doesn't specifically command Christians to tithe, the Old Testament people were commanded to. And on top of this, St. Paul often describes giving a regular and generous proportion of the first fruits of one's income — terms similar to a tithe (2 Cor. 8:7–23; 2 Cor. 9:2–7).

But here's another way to think about it. What was the point of the tithe in the Old Testament? Where did it go? This tithe was intended to support the ministry of the Levites. They were not given any land because they had no time to farm; their full-time job was the ministry. What does it say in the New Testament? "The Lord commanded that those who proclaim the gospel should get their living by the gospel" (1 Cor. 9:14). This is the verse that Luther used in the Small Catechism's Table of Duties to explain what Christians owe to the support of the ministry.

It seems clear from both the Old and the New Testaments that the tithe is the goal of Christians in their giving. But what if we're not there yet? How should we handle this? What are we to do?

Let's answer this by asking a different question. What would you say to your adult children who only attended church quarterly or once a month? After all, there is no passage in the New Testament that requires Christians to go to church weekly. Hebrews 10:25 is the closest verse we have, and it states simply that Christians should not neglect gathering together. And even though there is no passage that commands Christians to gather weekly, that is the implicit expectation throughout the Old and New Testaments.

So, what would you say to that son or daughter? The conversation might go something like this. I'm glad you're still going to church. It is a wonderful blessing to hear God's promises of forgiveness, life and salvation, and to receive His gifts in Word and Sacrament. But you can do better, and it will only be a blessing to you. There is a better way, and I'd really like you to try to attain it.

We should approach the topic of tithing with a similar conversation. The tithe is not specifically commanded in the New Testament, but it sure seems like the implicit expectation of both the Old and New Testaments. So, we're ecstatic that you're giving, and that you're giving in all these various ways — time, talents and treasures. But there is a better way. And that will only be a blessing to you, just as the Word of God — Old and New Testament alike — promises. Can you try increasing your gifts over the coming weeks, months and years? Can you put your trust in the God who sent His Son to take away your sin and give you everlasting life? And if He did this for you, if He did not spare His only Son, how will He not give you all things? He will not disappoint.



Radio Kala-FM Update:

As I mentioned before, Mr. Lara, Spanish programmer at Radio Station KALA, had been on vacation. He has been very supportive of the Hispanic broadcast returning to radio. As soon as I learned that he was returning to the Quad Cities, I made an appointment with him. He encouraged me to take the radio time on Saturdays, 7-8 am. I called Mr. Baker, KALA Director to fill

out the necessary form, take a picture for an ID card and obtain a door code for the radio room. That same week I was approved to conduct the first radio broadcast on Saturday, March 4th. I will do live broadcasts two Saturdays a month, and Mr. Lara will do it the remaining Saturdays using a pre-recorded program. On the Saturdays the program is pre-recorded I will be doing Latino ministry in Beardstown. We plan to advertise the radio program as well as CR activities in a local bilingual magazine and hopefully in other ways. We have requested a Ministry Outreach Grant from the CEF CID for the cost of radio broadcasts, give away gifts and advertising.

Bible Studies East Moline Correctional Center:

Bible studies continue at the correctional center. I hear amazing stories about wrong decisions made, and changes made by God in the lives of the inmates. One particular inmate offered a tremendous testimony as to how God has worked in his life. A musical band of inmates which has formed and played at a Christmas celebration at the center will perform again on April 20th to celebrate the Resurrection of Christ. Fellow Hispanics will be invited again.
