From the Pastor's desk - July 2023



Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ:

It's that time of year. You know. We bounce from graduation to graduation and from one celebration of the same to another. For us, it's become one of the signs of spring—like the arrival of Leo and Virgo as we look to the heavens. Or like the now fading blooms of our rhododendrons and azaleas. (I confess I still don't know the difference. Does anyone?) As the heat of summer sets in, all those glorious spring blooms will indeed fade. And winter is coming. Much like life.

It's rather difficult, as we attend those wonderful celebrations of a significant milestone in a young man's or woman's life, to avoid wallowing in a bit in nostalgia. We see the beauty and wonder and confidence of youth. We look at faces absent of those lines the years etch. We hear their voices tell of plans for learning and exploration. For them, for those brief moments of life, the opportunities are indeed endless, bounded only by imagination and will. We see on their faces a confidence allowed only by the abundance of time.

Sure, we hear them as we converse. And we, for those moments that only an occasion like a graduation would permit, feel the excitement of time and possibility that we too once felt. Maybe we even, returning to our hearths and havens, pull out those old picture books. Yellowing pages, sepia toned photos, and that smell of old paper: nostalgia blossoms as we see our own unlined faces.

And in another room, the mirror awaits.

Sometime, in the Year of Our Lord 1889, Oscar Wilde and Sir Arthur Conan Doyle sat in a London restaurant with the editor of a prominent American magazine. As the editor was looking for material to publish, Wilde pitched the idea of *The Picture of Dorian Gray*. Of course, the pitch was accepted. So successful was Wilde's subsequent work, that even if you've not read this fascinating piece of late nineteenth-century writing, you certainly are familiar with the work's theme. (Would that all our children

were still required to engage with these great works of Western literature.) You know how the portrait, which grows ever more grotesque with the passage of time, reflects the soul of Dorian Gray.

For you, and most certainly me, the mirror serves a similar purpose.

Now, that is not to say that you are engaged in the hedonism embraced by Dorian Gray (although our culture most certainly is). Of course you're not. And I make no such accusation here. But the mirror...

We look to those beautiful faces of youth. (And don't you wish that our youth could see it as we do? Are not *all* those youthful lives that surround us simply beautiful?) Yes, we look and see our walls and hearths bedecked with pictures of our own youth. We see our countenance recorded years, even decades, ago. Dark hair (or any hair!), bright eyes. And then we stroll into that darkened room where the truth awaits. The switch is flipped and the truth is there. Illumined. Staring back at us. There, in the bright light of reality, looking us squarely in our eyes, is the curse. The wages of sin is death, so our Lord's Word tells us.<sup>2</sup> And if we doubt, there is the mirror—the portrait of our curse.

We know all too well there's no stopping that clock. There's no stopping the slow chiseling of lines on our faces. We feel the chill seep into our bones—sweatshirts and sweaters always nearby. And our youthful hopes and dreams and possibilities are replaced by the consequences of the decisions we've made—some good and some not so much. Joys and regrets fill our thoughts. And time runs short. And even if we have the will to tilt at a windmill, we find our bodies in open revolt. And always the mirror reminding us of the truth. Dust we are. And to dust we soon will return.

Oddly, almost ridiculously, every now and then, when we look into that bold truth the mirror displays to us, we smile. And even laugh. Why? We know of a better truth. In the midst of a dark and dying world, we have been told. Long before our Lord walked among us, the great King David told us what was to come. Here are the words of this remarkable prophecy:

Bless the LORD, O my soul,
and all that is within me,
bless his holy name!
Bless the LORD, O my soul,
and forget not all his benefits,
who forgives all your iniquity,
who heals all your diseases,
who redeems your life from the pit,
who crowns you with steadfast love and mercy,
who satisfies you with good
so that your youth is renewed like the eagle's.3

We, baptized children of the Living God, will rise. Death is not the final word. St. Paul asks us as we peer into those all-too-truthful mirrors: Do you not know that all of us who have been baptized into Christ Jesus were baptized into his death? Paul asks and then answers his own question: We were buried therefore with him by baptism into death, in order that, just as Christ was raised from the dead by the glory of the Father, we too might walk in newness of life. For if we have been united with him in a death like his, we shall certainly be united with him in a resurrection like his.<sup>4</sup> It is the same question that we recite at each and every funeral, and, as the beautiful white pall is placed on the casket, we answer. We will rise. Our life will be redeemed from the pit. It has been redeemed by the Redeemer—our Redeemer. And our youth will be renewed.

We, indeed, are people of the Resurrection. Yes, we confess our Lord's resurrection, but we also confess our resurrection. The day will soon come when we will rise. The dust that once was our flesh will stand over our open graves. Renewed. Made whole by the Word of Life. We will be filled with joy, thanks, and life. Hope and faith will be things of the past—like those old photos. And we will, if we have them, look into a mirror and see a youthful face looking back at us. And, almost certainly, we will laugh.

But for now, knowing His word of promise, we wait. But we wait as people who know the whole truth.

But our citizenship is in heaven, and from it we await a Savior, the Lord Jesus Christ, who will transform our lowly body to be like his glorious body, by the power that enables him even to subject all things to himself. Therefore, my brothers, whom I love and long for, my joy and crown, stand firm thus in the Lord, my beloved.<sup>5</sup>

Go ... Sell All You Have?

"What must I do to inherit eternal life?" asked the rich young ruler. Jesus said, "You know the commandments." And he replied, "All these I have kept from my youth." And Jesus said to him, "One thing you still lack. Sell all that you have and distribute to the poor, and you will have treasure in heaven; and come, follow me" (Luke 18:18–22).

When we hear this story, this question comes to mind: is Jesus speaking to us also, or only to the rich young ruler? In other words, is Jesus telling us to sell all that we have and give it to the poor?

As good Lutherans, we answer, "No!" But why? Why should we not sell all that we have and distribute it to the poor? The simplest explanation is this: if we sold everything we have, our wife and our children would be neglected. In other words, to sell everything we have and give it to the poor would ignore, even abandon, those whom God has placed in our care. Our money, every-thing we have, is not to be used solely for the church. But that doesn't excuse us from using our money for the purpose God intends.

Everyone has three stations in life, three spheres in which we live and are to be of service to our neighbors. These stations are the church, the family and society. We are members of all three of these by birth. We are born into the church by water and the Word of God, and our duties to others in the church arise from our Baptism into the church. We are born into a family, and our duties to others stem from our birth into that family. Finally, we are born into society, which is simply a further extension of our birth into our family. The duties we have toward other members of society come from either our own birth or the birth of others into the same society.

All that we have and all that we are ought to be pressed into service for the church, the family and society. If we were to sell all we have and give only to one, the other two would be neglected, and we would falter in fulfilling our duties.

So, consider your life and all that you have in light of these three stations. You pay taxes to support and help those in society. You save for college for your children, and provide food, clothing and shelter for the members of your family.

But the station that is usually thought of last is the church. Since the needs of the family and society are more immediate, the church is often given what is left over. This is not how it should be. Rather, we are to give of our first fruits, from off the top, the best, even as Abel gave the best of his flock.

This requires forethought. It means that you sit down and make a plan of what you will give from the beginning. It means sticking to it even when it seems that there are other more immediate and pressing things.

And this is all the more necessary now as we enter into periods of time where giving is low due to high unemployment or where restrictions on meeting in church limit opportunities to give. If we love God and His gifts of forgiveness given through the means of grace, which we receive at church and only at church, then we will support it, just as we love our country and our family. For all that we have and all that we are is given to us by our gracious God. He spared no expense for us and our salvation. He gave up His Son to death so that our sins are forgiven, and we will live. What's more, He provides for all that we need for this body and life. And our lives in this world, among these three spheres of church, family and society are to mirror the generosity of the one who gave us life in all three at birth.

Don't let the church, your divine family, be an afterthought or even ignored. It is nurturing you, bringing you up in salvation through Word and Sacrament.

What more could the disciples of Jesus have wanted or needed? For three revolutions around the sun, these men had witnessed the mighty miracles of the Christ. Jesus had spoken to them the powerful words of his "upper room" discourse in John 13–17. Each of them could give firsthand accounts of the resurrected Savior. Jesus breathed out the Holy Spirit upon them, giving them the power to forgive and retain sins (John 20:22–23). And Luke tells us that Jesus even opened their minds to understand the Scriptures! (Luke 24:45).

Surely, these men were ready to get going. Yet, even all of this was not enough. "Stay in the city until you are clothed with power from on high" (Luke 24:49). When that day came, fulfilling Joel 2:28–29 and Isaiah 32:15, those disciples were made ready, by God's grace and power. The same Spirit has been given to you in Holy Baptism. Comfort and peace in the forgiveness of sins as won by Jesus on the cross is yours, as is the power to share that Gospel with family, friends, and neighbors. "Clothed with power from on high." That defines you forever through Baptism into Christ. There is nothing more you could want or need.

#### CID BOARD OF DIRECTORS REVIEW REPORT 05/23/23

Rev. Mark Eddy called the meeting to order. Rev. Mike Burdick finished our reading of 1 Peter. Minutes from the March 28<sup>th</sup> meeting were approved with corrections. Rev. Schuermann, the campus pastor at UniLu, highlighted recent years of especially young men being catechized and joining UniLu. He also gave an update on UniLu's partnership with the local pregnancy resource center to be ready for the 2023-2024 school year.

President Mohr reported that CID received 3 candidates, 2 vicars, and 1 deaconess from our seminaries. He joyfully anticipates the upcoming district installations and ordinations this summer. He asked for prayers for the upcoming Synodical Convention, floor committees, and delegates.

Mrs. Chris Andersen reported for CEF and their services to many in our district. CEF's 18-month 3% investment offer is still available. CEF awarded 4 Ministry Outreach Grants in April. CID CEF representatives were able to meet for the first time since Covid with the other independent CEFs and LCEF in St. Louis. Mr. Trip Rodgers gave his reports on Congregational Life and Education. The District Accreditation Commission names were approved for the accreditation of our district schools. Rev. Dr. Schurb happily stated that Concordia Historical Institute has published *Rediscovering The Issues*, a book on the 1974 walkout, to be available this year. Lutheran Legacy Foundation has committed to providing matching funds to our 4 endowment funds that support CID campus ministries for the next 10 years or until a total of \$500,000 has been raised. Dollars For Missions (DFM) continues to raise money for approved missions such as UniLu's 12-passenger van.

Financial Secretary, Mr. Jim Frazee voiced concern for the lack of congregational participation for DFM. Any congregation that is not participating or promoting DFM should speak with Rev. Schurb.

CID has paid Synod for the upcoming LC-MS convention expenses. All should submit their congregational portion for this year's LC-MS convention. Cristo Rey was approved to improve their parking lot in need of repair. The work week for CID staff was approved and defined as 5 days with two days off each week. Redeemer, Peru has closed and is in process of faithfully selling their property and assets. It was approved that the monies for the dissolution of Redeemer's property and assets be received into CID General Fund. St. John, Buckley's and Bethlehem, Petersburg's updated constitutions were approved.

The next CID Board of Directors meeting was set for September 26, 2023, 9:00 a.m.

Here in the United States, July 4th is a big national holiday. Many families gather together for cookouts. The beaches are full of visitors. Towns all across America have parades and fireworks. It is a time for family reunions and patriotic activities. Right?

We all love independence: political, social and personal, but spiritual independence can cause troubles. We have to recognize and accept our deep spiritual dependence on God. Jesus says in John 15:5: "I am the vine; you are the branches. If you remain in me and I in you, you will bear much fruit; apart from me you can do nothing."

As believers in Christ, we aren't independent but rather totally dependent on Jesus who died on the cross to offer us authentic freedom while at the same time deepening our dependence on Him, our Savior from sin. Magnets: We also have the design of the new bilingual advertising magnets to be distributed to contacts and the public. They are being made at this time. They contain name, address, email, telephone, service hours and the biblical text of Psalm 122:1

CID CEF Grant: Thanks to the collaboration of Mrs. Dodge, an application was made for a grant to CID CEF, which has already been approved. With this grant, radio time will be paid for on KALA, as well as advertisement about the radio program in Hola America, a bilingual newspaper that is distributed in the QC, and various Christian materials that will be given away to radio listeners. Thank you, CID CEF, for making this possible!

Prison Ministry: Last year there was an attendance at the Bible studies at East Moline Correctional Center of 2-5 people: but after the musical events that were held at Christmas and Easter, the attendance at the studies is now 15-17 people. Thank you, Lord! This includes three of the musicians who participate in the Christian band. By the way, one of the musicians was part of a widely recognized musical group in Mexico and in the Hispanic community in the US. We are getting new NVI Bibles, with a contemporary Spanish language since the 1960 Reina Valera Version contains a Spanish that is no longer used. In addition, many of the attendees speak English, but few know how to write it, and they like to speak and read Spanish.

Parking Lot: We are going to wait until the Hispanic Council meeting in July to decide what exactly CR will do with the back parking lot area. Meanwhile, CR members have organized and weeded the entire area and now it looks much better. At least the place no longer looks neglected.

CR Repairs: CR members were made aware that repairs need to be made to a wall in the Bible study room. In addition, the kitchen walls will be painted, and a new sink installed.

Evangelism Course: During the month of July, I will be doing an Evangelism course at CR in order to motivate members to share the Good News with people they know.
