From the Pastor's desk - August 2023



Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ:

I've wanted to teach, for some time now, a class on the Office of the Holy Ministry. I think what fostered this desire was, most recently, the time we discussed the omission of a comma in our Ephesians Bible Study. I'll add to this some discussions I've had, over the years, with people about the Office. Plus, I'm not sure when the last time an ordination was held at Immanuel for one of your pastors or when you last heard the vows taken by a candidate for the Office of the Holy Ministry. After some thought on all of these, I have concluded that the best way to teach this, albeit in a very introductory manner, is through my monthly newsletter. To that end, I will use the Rite of Ordination found in our Agenda.²

The rite begins with invoking, calling, on the name of the Lord. When we call upon Him, He promises to be with us. The presiding minister, usually the district president or circuit visitor, then addresses those gathered:

Beloved in the Lord, [the candidate for ordination] has been called by the Lord of the Church into the Office of Holy Ministry of the Word and Sacraments. He has been prepared for this ministry by careful study and prayer. He has been examined and declared ready to undertake this sacred responsibility, and, by the guidance of God the Holy Spirit, he has in the Church's usual order been called to be Pastor at [the church where the man is called]. According to apostolic practice, he is now presented to be ordained and consecrated to this office established by God.

¹ Specifically, Ephesians 4:12, which I have written about previously.

² The Agenda, formally titled *Lutheran Service Book Agenda*, is an official companion to the pew edition of the hymnal. It contains rites that are necessary for the church, yet not frequently used. This includes both the rites of Ordination and the Installation of the Pastor. When a man is ordained at the church where he is called to serve, the Ordination is immediately followed by the Rite of Installation. They are, however, two distinct rites. The rites are found in the Agenda starting on page 160. Please ask if you would like to peruse the Agenda. A copy is, of course, kept at church.

Note how this address summarizes the core tenets of ordination.

First, the man is called by God. Yes, the Lord uses people to mediate, that is facilitate, the call, but we confess that it is ultimately God who places that man in your midst. This is very important for all of us to note. It is important for me when I am discouraged or in disagreement with the people of the parish. It's important for me to remember, especially in those rough times, God has placed me in my call. And you can see this is also true for you. When you disagree with the pastor, or dislike what he is doing, you should then acknowledge that God has place the man there. Now, that doesn't mean you cannot question the pastor. He should and must demonstrate that all he is doing and teaching is in accord with Scripture and our Confessions.

Second, the address notes, however briefly, what the pastor is called to do. He is called into the ministry of Word and Sacrament. It's easy for all of us to lose sight of just what a pastor does and should be doing. He's not the chief executive of a little religious business. He is, to use the words of St. Paul, a servant of Christ and a steward of the mysteries of God.³ The Apostles were very careful to ensure they were able to devote themselves to the ministry of Word and Sacrament:

And the twelve summoned the full number of the disciples and said, "It is not right that we should give up preaching the word of God to serve tables. Therefore, brothers, pick out from among you seven men of good repute, full of the Spirit and of wisdom, whom we will appoint to this duty. But we will devote ourselves to prayer and to the ministry of the word."

So it should be for the men and churches that have come after them. Pastors are called by God to the ministry of proclaiming the Word and administering the Sacraments. As our Confessions note, the Office of the Holy Ministry is established to do this, and through these gifts that the pastor is steward of, the Holy Spirit establishes and sustains faith. You can also see, with this in mind, why Satan is pleased to busy us pastors with anything but what we are actually called to do. Think about that. A pastor can be very busy with things that look good and might even be necessary to the day-to-day general administration of the church. He can be busy and fill his time with doing anything but what he is actually placed there by God to do. This is something we should all guard against.

Finally, the man is prepared. For what is he prepared? For the above—to be a steward of the mysteries of God. He's not an entertainer, nor is he a motivational speaker. And he has been examined by the Church. For most of us that happens at the seminary. After a rigorous period of training (surprisingly so), he is examined by the Church. Typically, this is the seminary faculty under the supervision of the Council of Presidents of The Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod. This is to ensure that he is apt to teach in accordance with the Word of God.⁵

Okay, this will suffice for now, and I will continue with this, Lord willing, next month. But for now, note that succinct summary of the pastoral office given in the opening sentences of the Rite of Ordination.

40TH BIENNIAL CONVENTION IN MILWAUKEE, WISCONSIN

The Lutheran Women's Missionary League, also known as Lutheran Women in Mission, welcomed over 3,500 people to their 40th biennial convention in Milwaukee, Wisconsin, June 22–25, 2023, under the theme "Celebrate the Lord of the Nations." The convention theme was based on Psalm 33:12–13.

Define Your Life by How You Give

Winston Churchill reportedly said that "we make a living by what we get, but we make a life by what we give." According to Churchill, our lives are defined not by what we have gotten, but by what we give away.

Our Lord's life is defined in this way. He gave completely of Himself for us. He became man for us. He taught the truth of God's Word. He healed those with many and various diseases. He died the death that we deserved for our sins. He gave of Himself in order to save us from sin, death and hell. And so it is that by giving completely of Himself, He got for Himself us, making us citizens of His eternal kingdom by grace.

As it was for Jesus, so it also is for us. We get more from giving than we do from simply getting. For giving softens our hearts and frees us from the grip which the worries of this world and making a living has on us. For when we are singularly focused on making a living, we are singularly focused on what we get. That mindset begins to bleed into all areas of our lives — our relation-ships with friends and family, with neighbors and coworkers, and with the Lord. It shifts our focus from asking the question, "How can I be a friend, family member, neighbor and servant to others," to asking the question, "What have they done for me lately?" We become more selfish instead of selfless.

But when we give, we do not have less, we do not become less; rather, we have more and become more. When we give, we join in the bond of friendship and family, the bond of service to those around us out of love for them. And love is the fulfillment of the Law. It is the nature of God Himself, for God is Love. Thus, we are participating in the divine nature. As Jesus said, "It is more blessed to give than to receive" (Acts 20:35).

One day, I decided to do some yard work. I had the correct tools and gloves for my hands; so, I started to dig in the soil. I wanted to install an underground water pipe. After only a moment, I felt some little stings on my left arm from ants. I brushed them away and continued to finish my task. Later, I noticed various red marks on my arm and a huge desire to scratch them. Well, my friends, after four days I still have various red marks. How did these little ants have such tremendous power to cause me this much discomfort? They were just defending themselves from me.

This reminds me of people who try to defend themselves by saying that "little sins" or "white sins" are not so bad. Maybe all of us have thought the same thing. Have you ever thought this way? If we are truthful, it is very easy to commit "little sins" or "white sins" every day. And what about the big sins? Do you know how many times you sin every day? They are so numerous we can't count them! Only Jesus' blood provides forgiveness for our sins and cleanses us of our evil. 1 John 1:9 says: "If we confess our sins, He is faithful and just to forgive us our sins and to cleanse us from all unrighteousness." This is an extraordinary promise! God forgives us when we confess both little sins and big sins. We praise our good Lord for his merciful grace and love to us.

July 4th Parade, East Moline.: CR participated in this event. Volunteers including children, youth, and adults distributed Arch books to the children along the parade route as well as church and activities information to the adults. We participated with the KALA Radio station team. On this radio station is where CR has a live program every Saturday form 7-8 am proclaiming the Gospel to Hispanic listeners.



Prison Ministry: On July 6 an inmate at the East Moline Correctional Center was baptized and received into the Christian church after taking classes with Rev. Paul Weber, who is both the center's Chaplain as well as pastor, at Faith, Kewanee, IL. Bible Study at the center is conducted totally in Spanish and attendance is now 15-17 people. Thank you, Lord!

Evangelism Course: During July, I am teaching an Evangelism course in order to motivate CR members to share the Good News of Jesus Christ with people they know.

Beardstown Ministry: I continue to conduct services in Spanish twice a month at St John Lutheran Church in Beardstown with an attendance of 5-12 people. I ask for your prayers for the families that attended.

New Logo: Very soon, CR will have a new church logo! New signs for the outside of the church building will be made using the new logo and updated telephone number.

It has been almost 21 years since I came to the Quad Cities to begin a Hispanic ministry. During all these years we have always received the help of the Central Illinois District, the churches of the RI Circuit, and the Hispanic Council formed by members of the churches of the RI Circuit. At first, only my family of 5 gathered at St John's, EM. Soon we moved to the Christian Activity Center, a store front on 15th Ave. in East Moline. As God provided the increase, a former John Deere Credit Union building was purchased and converted into a very nice church building where we are able to proclaim the Good News to the Hispanic Community. God has been leading and guiding the entire way. Throughout all these years, many families have come to church faithfully, but then some stop attending and fall away. We have had ups and downs, and I assure you that if everyone who has come over the years had continued to come, we would have to build a bigger building! We praise God that He has built this church from nothing. There are currently 10 families attending for a total of 35 people, (13 children, 3 youth and 19 adults) All this by the grace of God! Our mission statement still stands: Planting the Gospel's Seed in the QC. All glory and honor to God!

Dear Friends of Cristo Rey, how can we ever thank you for your faithful support of Cristo Rey over the years? This month marks twenty-one years of ministry among the Hispanics in the Quad Cities area.

We praise God for what He has accomplished during these years, and we thank YOU for your prayers and financial support.

Free to Die: The Martyrs as Our Christian Heroes

A DOXOLOGY Seminar
