From the Pastor's desk - November 2023



Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ:

"Let the words of my mouth and the meditation of my heart be acceptable in your sight, O LORD, my rock and my redeemer" Psalm 19:4.

One minute: We're okay. Two minutes: The sounds of fidgeting are heard, and they quickly multiply. Three minutes: It seems we're experiencing eternity. It's very hard for us, isn't it? The "eternity" I describe was an "experiment" I conducted during an evening service a number of years ago. In that service we followed two unique rubrics: a long period (three minutes, timed by the author) of reflection (meditation) between the confession and the absolution, and a long period of meditation after the reading of God's Word. I was struck by the fact that three minutes (one hundred eighty seconds) seemed like a black hole from whence we would ne'er return—forever stuck in a state of awkward silence.

It seemed a simple task. Take a small bit of time to meditate on two things. First, we would reflect on the powerful words of confession before the absolution. The congregation and I would be seated after confessing and before the glorious words of absolution were spoken upon us. We sat, and the task was to train our minds and hearts on the words we had just said—to be receptive to the Lord's condemning Law we had just collectively spoken. And later, after reading the Holy Word of God—the Word of Christ—we would sit again and meditate. The simple task was to sit quietly and reflect—meditate—on the Word of Life we had just received. Tick. Tick. Even the pastor (yours truly) glanced at the timepiece, thinking surely several minutes had passed. Surely the three-minute goal had come and gone—distantly visible in the rear-view mirror. Not so. After an uncomfortable length of silence, the timepiece revealed the truth: Not even a minute had elapsed. There we sat, uncomfortable in our silence. Hearts and minds that were gathered to receive the good gifts of God were distracted by the stillness. We were meditating on our meditation—and we were distracted by it.

How did we get here? How did we get to a point that, within the Divine Service where and when (as noted above) we gathered to receive the gift of Christ, the quiet reception of His gifts—that silence—became awkward? Could it be that our lives, so filled with constant stimuli, view the absence of stimuli as a threat? Perhaps. Could it be that our lives, so filled with the "junk food" of our culture, have no appetite for real food? Possibly. Maybe we are so used to being receptive to all the noise and distractions around us that quietness and contemplation have become alien. Quite possibly we remain receptive, but we remain receptive to the wrong things. Our hearts, if you will, are tuned to the wrong station(s).

We are listening creatures. Listening influences the way we think. As St. Paul notes, "faith comes through hearing." A lot of things come through hearing. Hearing feeds the heart—and in that sense, you are what you eat. Each Lord's Day God sets before you a veritable buffet. He feeds you with His Word—the Word spoken, chanted, and sung (hence our seemingly obsessive focus on not only what we say but also on what we sing—is it feeding us the good food?). The proclaimer of the Word, called by God to do just that, has very specific instructions: Teach them to keep (guard) all things Christ has commanded while proclaiming Christ the Crucified. Read St. Paul. Note how he speaks of justification, faith, and sanctification (the Gospel) only while speaking of Christ. To say it negatively, St. Paul does not speak of these things apart from speaking of Christ—they are always (the Gospel is always) linked to Christ. The pastor (the one called to the preaching office) must set before you Christ and Him crucified for you. Then what? Through the Church and the Office of the Holy Ministry, the Lord feeds you—literally—Christ. Take! Eat! This is for you! We hear, speak, chant, eat, and sing the Word of Christ—the Word made flesh. If you are passing by this buffet, or if this rich, life-giving food has been replaced by junk food, you will still be fed, but the question arises: fed with what?

A receptive heart begins and ends with the Divine Service—God's coming to His people to feed them. Not attending the Divine Service? That right there, Ol' Buddy, is your problem. If you're not eating there, where are you eating? What is your heart receiving? What you receive is that on which you meditate. You are what you eat.

The meditation that comes from receiving Christ in the Divine Service happens in many places. Conversations, music, what we see, and what we feel all can be triggers for meditation, as can be sitting quietly. However, sometimes our lives are so filled with "noise" that we can only hear "static." As a pastor at a liturgical church, I often hear those from other confessions note that our church services are very quiet (sometimes that's a polite way of saying they are boring). Receiving is quiet. Receiving is boring. "We don't do anything." "We don't participate." "Why can't I help?" So go the comments. To this I answer: Reception receives. You see, the stillness noted above that we found so disconcerting was a symptom. It was a symptom of the disease that the concept and practice of receiving what God gives and peacefully reflecting on that gift is alien to us. "I must have to do something to help all this along." No. Scripture is quite clear. You are dead until God in Christ makes you alive. This happens in the Divine Service where God serves you. That's where it begins, and that's where it ends, when at last our little beds—caskets—are wheeled in before His altar.

We, hopefully, learn—week after week, year after year—to sit and receive. In God's Service to us, a receptive heart is formed by God himself. For all this we sit quietly and wait. We wait to finally say: "Amen!" This is true!

The practice of receptive meditation begins here, quietly, in the place where the Lord has put his Name—where He puts that Name on you in Holy Baptism. It begins in the place where He promises to be. Perhaps—and this spills over into the other areas of our lives—we're too busy demanding of God (which is what the noise of the world would have us do) to receive and meditate on what He says to us. Remember, the Divine Service is where we receive—a point too often lost in American Christianity. If you think the Divine Service is about what you offer (works) and what you desire for that work (reward), you are not listening. If you are meditating on what you want from God as opposed to what He gives, your receptive heart is not receiving. You're not eating in the right place.

Next time you attend the Divine Service, sit. Listen. Receive. Take your hymnal home. Read it. Read the words we say week after week, year after year. Almost all are direct quotes of Scripture. All are drawn from Scripture. See in those words the language of reception. "O Lord open my lips..." The whole service, whether Matins, Vespers, page 184, etc., is a grand confession of who we are before God and what He does for us. We say what God says—this is the essence of confession. The receptive heart hears these words. Why would God say this about me? Am I a poor miserable sinner? Am I forgiven for the sake of Christ? Receptive meditation receives the answers from God Himself. As God answers through the preaching office, through the Holy Supper, through Baptism, our hearts begin to hear Him. We stop asking for ourselves—bargaining. We stop listening to the noise of the world and our busy lives, and we start hearing the Truth. I am a poor miserable sinner. For the sake of the holy, bitter, innocent suffering and death of our Lord Jesus Christ, He has had mercy on me. So, with the words of the Divine Service, our "self" is cast aside. In these words we are taught to receive, as we receive Him in Word and Sacrament.

Can you then see how this spills over into our meditation at home, at work, or wherever meditation occurs? When troubles happen, our meditation becomes less about what we want and more about what God seeks to do through circumstance. Our hearts receive the bad news, the good news, the admonishments and rebukes. Our hearts cry out: Thy will be done! As we cry, because of His service to us in Christ, we know that we have received the gift of life, the gift of forgiveness, the gift of an empty grave. It is the good food that sustains us!

Need a receptive heart (who doesn't)? Be fed by God. Stop listening to the noise of the world that tells you to look and experience God anywhere but in the place He has promised to be. Come to the buffet. Sit and listen. You are what you hear. In all this, know that Christ is there. Christ is there rescuing you. He is rescuing you from the death caused by your sin and making you a new creation. I suspect we could ruminate on that thought alone for far longer than three minutes.

DO YOU BELIEVE THIS?

One ancient tradition which is growing stronger little by little among the Hispanics is the belief that dead people return to earth to visit people. There is a special day to mark this tradition. It is called The Day of the Dead (Día de Muertos), and it's held on Nov. 1st and 2nd. Many people believe that this great, ancient and historic tradition was started by the Indians before Spain's conquest. Actually, families decorate a special place in their home. This is called the Altar, where their dead love ones' pictures are displayed with candles, colorful papers, their favorite meals and beverages, skull candies, and bread (Death bread). They believe that their relatives return from the dead to enjoy these items. The media contribute to this with live coverage from homes and even cemeteries, where people spend entire nights decorating with flowers and candles. Do you find some similarities to Halloween?

Hispanics who live in the U. S. want to preserve this tradition, even right here in the United States. As Christians we must reject this false tradition. Please read 1 John 3: 1b-3 "The reason the world does not know us is that it did not know him. Dear friends, now we are children of God, and what we will be has not yet been made known. But we know that when Christ appears, we shall be like him, for we shall see him as he is. All who have this hope in him purify themselves, just as he is pure."

What true and amazing words we find in the Holy Scriptures! These words become a great comfort to all as we come to believe in Jesus Christ. The unbelievers may not believe at first what the words say, but Christians need to continue sharing and proclaiming the Good News in Christ. We're confident and we stand on what He says:

"I AM THE RESURRECTION AND THE LIFE. THE ONE WHO BELIEVES IN ME WILL LIVE, EVEN THOUGH THEY DIE; AND WHOEVER LIVES BY BELIEVING IN ME WILL NEVER DIE. DO YOU BELIEVE THIS?"

ALWAYS GIVE THANKS!

In the last weeks I have seen many faces of people which exhibit confusion, loneliness, bitterness, sadness, anguish, and desperation motivated by family troubles, divorce, sickness, death of a loved one, lack of or loss of work, etc. Words are not necessary when body language informs me that they are living through a difficult period in their life. Some of them have called and asked me to visit them in their homes or they have come to the church office. They want to talk about their present situation and receive spiritual advice. They want a quick solution without any hurt or damage to their lives. Will they have a pleasant and happy Thanksgiving dinner?

Once I heard this: "It's so good that you don't have any troubles. I'm sure, all of your family is so happy, because, as Christians, God takes care of you". Well, you and I know that this is not true at all. Believers in Christ have all kinds of troubles and we all suffer at one time or another. We have a long list of troubles, right? So, can we as Christians give thanks to God when we are going through a difficult time?

I'm going to share this true story. It's a story my grandma used to tell. In a very small town, there lived a faithful Christian man. Every day before the sun began to shine, he prayed. He prayed aloud, and everyone in the town was able to hear him. My Grandma said he never failed to pray. It didn't matter what kind of day it was, sunny or rainy, cold, or hot. He prayed with gratitude and thanksgiving. My grandma said that he never complained even though he worked hard as a farmer. He always gave thanks to God for all the gifts he received.

I'm happy when I see joyful, loving families. Their faces tell me that God has been blessing them and showing me how He protects them in their daily lives. They know God is with them in all the circumstances of life. I'm pretty sure these believers in Jesus will have a pleasant and happy Thanksgiving dinner.

What about you? Are you worried? Do you have troubles? Do you feel as though no one listens or cares about you? Think about what Saint Paul tells us in Philippians 4:6,7

"Do not be anxious about anything, but in every situation, by prayer and petition, with thanksgiving, present your requests to God. And the peace of God, which transcends all understanding, will guard your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus."
