From the Pastor's desk – May 2024



Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ:

Right out of the gate, let me say this: I have never been cool. Whatever it is, it eludes me. I'm also at the age where it doesn't really matter. For the most part, I'm okay with that. For the most part. Oddly, even as an old man that lack of coolness occasionally haunts me. Allow me to explain...

There is no denying that our culture gravitates toward the "cool." And those that are perceived as "uncool" are often derided in some way. Think of the long-lasting and rather pejorative moniker of "nerd." To be on the wrong side of the cool border leaves one outside and often alone. The problem is this: the definition of what makes one cool is always changing, and it is defined by the culture. Behind this lurks consumerism.

Think about it. Pants are pants. But imagine, aging adult, showing up to anything but a costume party in hip-hugging bell-bottoms and ultra-wide collared print shirts that were the icon of the "in" crowd of my formative years. How would you be perceived? And how would this make you feel about yourself? It is rather sad, even pathetic, that our self-image is formed by pants and shirts and Stanley mugs.¹ Yet, there remains the seduction. To be cool is to be in—to be relevant. (Relevant is one of those words that has become ensconced in churchly jargon. It sounds cool, yet it defies any comprehensive definition. Why? Well, what is relevant to me is rarely relevant to you. We are at different stages of life, have different—albeit sinful—worries, and are entertained by different things. Yet, I think the church clings to words like this because they sound cool—at least for now. You dig?)

It's a strong seduction. Even for me. The Old Adam loves to be the center of attention. Pride, that great sin, is ever present. Here, C.S. Lewis so precisely shines:

It is because I wanted to be the big noise at the party that I am so annoyed at someone else being the big noise. Two of a trade never agree. Now what you want to get clear is that Pride is essentially competitive—is competitive by its very nature—while the other vices are competitive only, so to speak, by accident. Pride gets no pleasure out of having something, only out of having more of it than the next man.²

So yes, as the Old Adam in me refuses to die, the sinful self in me wants to be the center of attention. So, the seduction of cool. Yet, for someone like me, it's the dog chasing its tail.

It's the same for our little churches. It's no fun to be laughed at for what we believe. It's no fun to be told, explicitly or implicitly, that we must evolve or die. And when we, as a church, fall to that seduction, it's interesting what begins to happen. First, we begin to justify every whim with the handy-dandy trump card of "Therefore go and make disciples of all nations..." And we stop there. But our Lord tells us how disciples are made and kept: by baptism and teaching. And the first things to be abandoned are what the *culture* tells us are irrelevant. Remember, when we desire to swim in the cool pool, it is the culture that hands out the towels and holds the whistle. When I was first ordained, the culture encouraged abandoning the liturgy (too cumbersome), adding children's church (sure, let's pull the kids out of church at the precise moment when the pastor is about to do what He is called to do—teach), offering "seeker" oriented services (even in the LCMS—even though that concept isn't found in Scripture), and dressing in the uniform of the day (faux-hawk, Hebrew tat and untucked shirt). And the music: replacing congregational singing with performance. These things were thrust upon us by the culture. This is how, we were told, we would attract the culture and remain relevant. This, we were told, was how to be cool. And the promise was: if you do it, they will come. And they did. They just didn't stay. Remember how I said cool is an ever-changing concept? When it changed, they went looking for what fit the definition. Coffee shops in the narthex. The chancel replaced with a stage. Emotions supplanting proclamation of the Word and the Sacraments as proof of salvation.

And then there's the teaching. I remind you again that the culture sets the agenda for what is to be regarded as hip and relevant. It tells us what it wants to hear. And too often churches soft sell the truth. And they are left in a quandary. The decision is made to water down the truth to get people in the door. But then a choice is presented: keep watering down the truth or finally speak the full truth knowing that it will do what it always does. It makes us uncomfortable.³ It pierces souls. The truth, it seems, is uncool.

Instead of graphs and business models determining what sells and what doesn't, and waiting for the culture to tell us what we should be about, maybe, just maybe, we should heed the Word of the Lord. In his very first recorded sermon, He says this to us: "Blessed are you when others revile you and persecute you and utter all kinds of evil against you falsely on my account. Rejoice and be glad, for your reward is great in heaven, for so they persecuted the prophets who were before you" (Matthew 5:11-12). He tells us exactly what clinging to Him and His Word does. And He adds to that exactly how useless we are when we succumb to the lure of the world and hedge on speaking the truth: "You are the salt of the earth, but if salt has lost its taste, how shall its saltiness be restored? It is no longer good for anything except to be thrown out and trampled under people's feet" (Matthew 5:13). And when He sends out the twelve, preceding our being sent to our neighbors, He warns: "and you will be hated by all for my name's sake. But the one who endures to the end will be saved" (Matthew 10:22).

Through all of this, He promises that His Word will do exactly what He wants it to do. That should be enough for us. We proclaim. He works through that proclamation.

Think of St. Paul standing before the Areopagus in Athens, preaching without concern for public perception:

The times of ignorance God overlooked, but now he commands all people everywhere to repent, because he has fixed a day on which he will judge the world in righteousness by a man whom he has appointed; and of this he has given assurance to all by raising him from the dead.

Now when they heard of the resurrection of the dead, some mocked (Acts 17:30-32).

St. Paul, with His great learning (as we also learn from Acts), did not concern himself with how the truth would be perceived. He merely did what he was given to do. He spoke the whole truth. And recall that it is St. Paul who reminds us exactly where salvation is found: "*For the word of the cross is folly to those who are perishing, but to us who are being saved it is the power of God*" (1 Corinthians 1:18).

At the end of it all, that is my prayer. That I (we) would be content with the culture labeling us as uncool. And that I (we) would strive to be, above all else, faithful.

More Than a Negative

Even if you've never had to testify in court, a thousand TV shows have made you familiar with the question, "Do you swear to tell the truth, the whole truth and nothing but the truth?" Why not just make people swear to tell the truth? Or make them promise not to lie?

Any parent who has ever had to interrogate a child about a broken cookie jar or a scuffle over a toy knows the answer. There are plenty of ways to try to get out of trouble without technically lying. You tell just enough of the truth to skate on by.

We often play the game of seeing how close we can get to sinning without technically going over the line.

But in our heart of hearts we know that this is not what God intended when He gave us the commandments. He's not giving us a merely negative rule and challenging us to just barely stay away from this or that. There is much more to each commandment than a prohibition. We shouldn't just avoid murdering people — we should be of service to our neighbor.

For each negative prohibition in the commandments there is a positive good that we are to cherish and protect. In the Eighth Commandment, that gift is the reputation of our neighbor and our relationship with him:

You shall not give false testimony against your neighbor.

What does this mean? We should fear and love God so that we do not tell lies about our neighbor, betray him, slander him, or hurt his reputation, but defend him, speak well of him, and explain everything in the kindest way.

Your relationship with your family members (who are your nearest neighbors), the other members of your congregation, your coworkers and your friends is one of the most precious gifts you have been given. You need to exercise good stewardship with this gift just as much as you need to exercise good stewardship with this gift just as much as you need to exercise good stewardship with this is an especially fragile gift because it's easy to ruin a relationship with slander and talking behind someone's back.

But speaking well of your neighbor in Christian love is absolutely free; it costs you nothing, yet it pays you great dividends. If you find this challenging at times, if you are tempted to speak ill of others, just remember that this other person is also a beloved child of God for whom your Lord Jesus suffered and died. Your Lord Jesus loves you both.

In Mexico Mothers' Day is always celebrated on May 10th. It is the most beloved and important festival of the year for the family. It is a tradition that the children sing songs to their mothers on this day. We call it "serenata". A serenata consists of songs sung in the early morning with live music. Some hire a group of musicians with acoustic guitars. Others employ "The Mariachi", (The Mariachi is a group of musicians who play traditional folk music with guitars, trumpets, and violins). Or friends with acoustic guitars may form a group and travel to their mothers' houses and sing two or three songs. Upon finishing the

songs, the mother must leave the house and thank the children personally with a hug and a kiss.

On this day, the mothers also receive gifts: flowers, hugs, kisses, and a lot of love from their children in appreciation. It is also a custom to observe festivals for the mothers in the elementary schools, where the students carry out dance

numbers, interpret some songs and perform some recitations like poems for mothers. Mothers are so pleased when they see their children doing something for them. In many schools the students do some handcrafts, like decorations for the house for their mothers. Children give it to them on Mother's Day, May 10.

Many families are accustomed to being together to celebrate with their moms. They bring a special meal or some plates while others make reservations in a restaurant. The idea is to spend major time with their moms in order to honor

them on their special day. At Cristo Rey we are going to celebrate Mothers' Day and give gifts on Sunday, May 12th.
