From the Pastor's desk - June 2024



Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ:

For some time now I've been thinking about the sharing of the peace. At least that was what it was called in the church of my youth. In our churches it has morphed into a general greeting often done prior to the beginning of the service. So it was at Immanuel. At least until Covid. And we've not restarted it since. Maybe it's time. Maybe it's time to return to what was originally intended.

A number of people over the years, have shared with me their discomfort with the pre-service greeting. And I must confess, I'm in their camp. Now, some of this comes from my personal idiosyncrasies. To me, it seems a bit forced. It's like the bro-hug, or the gross over-use (in my humble opinion) of the word love. These things have become so commonplace as to be emptied of content. I like to think, or fool myself into thinking, that if a hug or the "I" word is offered, there is a genuine bond between us, or the context calls for and necessitates a natural and close expression of our bond as members of the Body of Christ. Still, I'll concede that this might be just my personal hang-up. But there's more.

As a pastor I pray, hope, teach, and in whatever ways I can act to build up the body of Christ. One of the things that piques my interest is related to the general greeting. If you are waiting or only reaching out to your brothers and sisters in our church during that short greeting period, I'm certain you're missing the point. There are ten thousand eighty minutes in a week. That's over ten thousand minutes (less the two or three slotted for a pre-service general greeting) for you to reach out to your brother or sister in Christ. Thankfully, many of you, if not most of you, do this. But I am aware of a few people, after sitting in a pew for a good number of years, who do not know the name of the person sitting next to them. Or perhaps, after a person's or family's extended absence, some might ask me if there is a problem. Are they okay? I hope (and I do pray) that they would know—that they would call, text, stop by and check on their brothers and sisters in Christ. It is my opinion that you and I checking on our brothers and sisters would go a long way toward the building up of the body of Christ at Immanuel. I encourage you—strongly—to get to know each other. And I am thankful that many of you do. Very thankful!

All this, however, is far from the intent of the greeting, or sharing of the peace, that may occur *within* the service. In Divine Service One¹ the following rubric is printed just after the Prayer of the Church: "Following the prayers, the people may greet one another in the name of the Lord, saying, 'Peace be with you,' as a sign of reconciliation and of the unity of the Spirit in the bond of peace (Matt. 5:22–24; Eph. 4:1–3)." As this rubric notes, the greeting is a sign of reconciliation, and it is ancient. It indeed has as its source the very words spoken by the mouth of our Lord. In His Sermon on the Mount, He preaches the following:

"You have heard that it was said to those of old, You shall not murder; and whoever murders will be liable to judgment." But I say to you that everyone who is angry with his brother will be liable to judgment; whoever insults his brother will be liable to the council; and whoever says, You fool! will be liable to the hell of fire. So if you are offering your gift at the altar and there remember that your brother has something against you, leave your gift there before the altar and go. First be reconciled to your brother, and then come and offer your gift. Come to terms quickly with your accuser while you are going with him to court, lest your accuser hand you over to the judge, and the judge to the guard, and you be put in prison. Truly, I say to you, you will never get out until you have paid the last penny."

You can see from these words, the roots of the greeting, that there is something much deeper than a simple hello. The point of the greeting *within* the service is to allow you the opportunity to ask for forgiveness and to grant forgiveness to your brother or sister in Christ. And it is serious business.

As people of God, redeemed and sanctified by the blood of Christ, we realize, or we should, how much we sin and are forgiven each day. Our Lord teaches us that we must extend this forgiveness to each other. The peace He made is for sharing. I realize that in a church, which is very much like a family, we will sin against each other. Forgiven we are, and, at the same time, sinners we are. We will do things and say things that hurt our neighbor. As a pastor I am keenly aware of this. Knowledge of what you say about me, even the critical and hurtful things, seems to find its way to me. Sinners we are. And all is forgiven. There is no file, no record. There is just forgiveness. Saints we are. Sinners we are. I am also aware at times of what you say about others. Sometimes you speak about things that happened long, long ago. If you are carrying these burdens, these grudges, it is time to forgive. And forget. Our Lord asks you to do so. Note the conditionality in the above quote. There is a warning about kneeling elbow to elbow with someone you choose not to forgive.

In the same sermon a short while later, again our Lord speaks of this and says to us: "For if you forgive others their trespasses, your heavenly Father will also forgive you, but if you do not forgive others their trespasses, neither will your Father forgive your trespasses." Note the condition. If you do not forgive, you will not be forgiven. Yes, it is very serious business. And think about how the failure to forgive each other appears to those outside of the church. When your neighbors listen to you gripe about your brothers and sisters who are also redeemed by Christ, a very poor witness it is. It is a stumbling block. Hence the sharing of the peace.

Just before we approach the altar to receive the very body and blood that was shed to make us what we are, we are invited to let go of the baggage that drags our hearts through the graveyard of unforgiveness. We have an opportunity to greet each other and share the peace of Christ. That is the point of the greeting. And that's what I would like to see us do.

I think sometimes we forget just how powerful words of forgiveness and the asking of forgiveness are. I'm certain Satan is aware of this and would love for us to not share those words and to nurse our grudges. That will not be us. We, after all, are Christians.

So please think about this in the days ahead as the Elders and I discuss this. In the meantime, if your conscience is nagging you about an unresolved issue, don't ignore it. Act on it. Reach out. Ask. Talk. You will joyfully find that we are people who rejoice in offering forgiveness. And as you receive those blessed words of freedom from your brothers and sisters in Christ, you will be freed. And you will be filled with joy—and peace.

Holy Communion Is a Living Communion with Christ

What kind of body and blood do we receive in the Lord's Supper? Dead blood coagulates; it dries up with nothing more to give. We don't receive Jesus' dead blood on the old rugged cross, on a hill far away. We don't receive a transfusion from an inanimate corpse. We don't paint His blood on ourselves as if we were the doorposts of Goshen.

Christ is risen! Jesus' living blood flows and gives us His life. He, His Word, body, and blood are doing the doing. The risen Lamb of God takes away our sins today! Christ is the operator; you're the operated. Dr. Jesus donates His living body and blood outside of us under bread and wine, but for us Christians to eat and to drink. It's packed with Divine virility, and Jesus is a matching human universal donor for you (Heb. 9:14). You are a matching recipient by faith.

We call it the Sacrament of the Altar because Jesus actually does this at each of our altars. At His word, we receive the same body and blood that died on the cross but is now risen. We receive that life that cannot die. Jesus' living blood has everything to sustain us to live though we also die, and to await the resurrection of our bodies and the life everlasting. Jesus is alive and He pumps life into His church via His word and His body and blood. We live because He lives in Communion with us.

GREENFIELD, Iowa (FOX 9) - Survey teams have rated <u>the tornado</u> that ripped through a <u>small lowa</u> <u>city</u>, leaving four people dead, as an EF-4 storm.

Officials say the tornado was on the ground for about 44 miles, with peak winds between 175 mph and 185 mph, tracking northeast, losing strength shortly after ripping through the City of Greenfield.

The National Weather Service says further "refinement" is possible, so the rating could increase. On Wednesday, crews said they had found evidence of at least EF-3 damage before upgrading the storm on Thursday.

On Wednesday night, officials said four people were killed and at least 35 were injured during the storm on Tuesday night.

The damage has left parts of the town in ruins, leveling houses, uprooting trees, and downing powerlines.

Greenfield is home to about 2,000 people. State officials have declared a disaster for the city and are applying for an expedited federal declaration.

The Gift of Contentment

As children grow up, they often feel cramped by their parents' restrictions. Dad says to be home by 11. But why can't I say out 'til midnight? Mom says to clean your room on Saturday morning. But I want to sleep in late, then roll out of bed, hop in the car and go to my friend's house without delay. I want to do what I decide is best.

The older we get, and especially when we have kids of our own, we begin to see the truth. Mom and Dad were not cramping our style or trying to crush our personal freedom — they were looking out for us, providing for us and teaching us a better way of life.

If that's how it is with fallible human parents, how much more so with our Heavenly Father! We sinners often feel cramped by the Law of God. Our sinful flesh wants to go its own way, do its own thing and be in charge. But in our heart of hearts, we know how foolish this is. We know that God loves us, and therefore all of His commands are for our benefit. Each one of His commandments is meant to bless us. Consider the last two commandments:

You shall not covet your neighbor's house.

What does this mean? We should fear and love God so that we do not scheme to get our neighbor's inheritance or house, or get it in a way which only appears right, but help and be of service to him in keeping it. (SC II)

You shall not covet your neighbor's wife, or his manservant or maidservant, his ox or donkey, or anything that belongs to your neighbor.

What does this mean? We should fear and love God so that we do not entice or force away our neighbor's wife, workers, or animals, or turn them against him, but urge them to stay and do their duty. (SC II)

The commandments against coveting are warning us against losing one of the greatest gifts we can possess: contentment. Being content and thankful with what God has provided for us is a necessary building block of living a happy life. Unthankful coveting of what we have not been given will only make us miserable, so God warns us against it.

God has proven His love for us in sending His only begotten Son to shed His blood for us, cleanse us of our sins and brings us back into His family. If He loves us this much, then when percentage of His commandments do you think are meant to harm us? Probably no more than one or two percent, right? Of course that's absurd. God means to bless us with everything He says to us. The Law of God simply describes what a truly happy life, lived in thankfulness to Christ, looks like: It's a generous, merciful, contented life that uses all of the resources God has given us for His purposes.

In almost all offices and workplaces, there are secretaries whose work is very important. When I worked in Monterrey, there was a secretary who was excellent at her job. When the boss asked for a special work report, she already had it for him, because she had prepared it in advance so it would be ready when he requested it. She was very efficient, although the person to whom the credit was given was often not her, but her boss.

In a sense, the work of the Holy Spirit is like that of an efficient and excellent secretary, only much better. The Holy Spirit works in anonymity, behind the scenes as such, but is perfectly efficient and excellent.

We speak much of God the Father, since we address many of our prayers to Him. We talk a lot about Jesus, the Son of God, and what He did for us on the cross, but when we don't often mention the Holy Spirit, it does not mean that He is inactive. Far from it! The Holy Spirit is the third person of the Holy Trinity and is always active, working in our hearts to lead us to Christ.



The Holy Spirit is like the beating heart in each one of us. We do not know how this vital organ works, nor do we know how many liters of blood pass through it. All we know is that the heart is there pumping all the blood that runs through the veins and arteries of our body and does this without us noticing it. It's the same with the Holy Spirit. His work is important and indispensable for our spiritual health and our salvation.

This year, on May 19th, the church celebrated Pentecost which is one of the most important Christian holidays. On this day we enter the season of the church year known

as Pentecost. It is the day when a great change occurred in the life of the early Christian church. Many say that Pentecost is the birthday of the church. On this day, there was a tremendous change!

<u>The change in the disciples</u>. After the death of Jesus, the disciples were frightened. They felt that God had abandoned them. They hid together in one place, separated from the bustle of people who walked and celebrated in the streets. They were afraid of being persecuted and imprisoned. They also feared that their lives might end on the cross. That is why they were all hidden under one roof, full of fear of being seen in the light.

But Pentecost came, nonetheless. The disciples heard the wind coming from the sky, and tongues of fire perched on their heads. They felt the strengthening presence of the Holy Spirit which Jesus had promised them as recorded in Acts 1:8. He told them to wait for the Holy Spirit and that when He came, they would receive power and be the most vigorous witnesses of the Gospel to everyone.

And that's exactly what happened. The Holy Spirit encouraged them to take to the streets and start vigorously proclaiming the message of salvation in Jesus Christ. They would have nothing to fear anymore; God was in their hearts; God was in their words; God was in their bodies and minds. God Himself gave them the strength and

enabled them to speak without fear. And that was what they did! All left the place where they had been hiding and began to speak in foreign languages they had never learned. They talked about Jesus and what He had done.

<u>The change in the crowd</u>. Peter, standing, addressed the crowd and gave a wonderful and glorious sermon. Indeed, a change had occurred! The Lord touched and changed the hearts of the people, and that day 3000 people were added to the church.


