From the Pastor's desk – July 2024



Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ:

You are free.

Jesus answered them, "Truly, truly, I say to you, everyone who practices sin is a slave to sin. The slave does not remain in the house forever; the son remains forever. So if the Son sets you free, you will be free indeed" (John 8:34-36).

The Son, indeed, has set you free. He has taken your sin and put it to death. Think about that. Your sin, on the cross of our Lord and Savior, has been put to death. Dead men tell no tales. Sin, dead as it is, can no longer accuse you. You, because of the Christ, are free. You now can stand before God with a good conscience. Did you ever think about what that means? What does it mean to be able to stand before God with a good conscience? Both St. Peter and St. Paul speak in this way. The record of our sins, the charges that stand against us have been cancelled—nailed to the cross.

And you, who were dead in your trespasses and the uncircumcision of your flesh, God made alive together with him, having forgiven us all our trespasses, by canceling the record of debt that stood against us with its legal demands. This he set aside, nailing it to the cross. He disarmed the rulers and authorities and put them to open shame, by triumphing over them in him (Colossians 2:13-15).

Who is now able to accuse you? Now that the record of your sin is gone. What accusation can be made against you? As you stand before God, sins dead and buried beneath the perfect righteousness of Christ, you need not fear any accusation, however true, or the memories that haunt you. This is what it means to have a good conscience.

You, indeed, are free.

But, to lapse into cliché, freedom isn't free.

Have you ever lied to anyone? This is a letter, and it is not a format for asking questions and receiving responses. But that's okay. I already know the answer. Somewhere in your past, a lie lurks. You, at some point, prevaricated. You fibbed to a friend (or ex-friend). You lied to someone you love. You have tried to lie to God—good luck with that one. And you have lied to yourself. There was a sad time in my life when I told myself it was okay to *not* go to church—thoughtful study of the Word of God wasn't a remote possibility or desire in my thoughts. I convinced myself that I was a good person. Of course, that was a lie. When we try to justify ourselves and our actions, we set the bar very, very low. We compare ourselves, not to what the Lord gives us, but to our neighbor. And we conveniently forget our own selfishness and pride. We refuse to recall the hurts we caused. In short, we lie to ourselves. Yet, God knows. You have no secrets before Him. Those "little" things you work to keep buried within yourself. Those are never kept from Him. As we pastors preach His Word to you, that is one of the fundamental tasks: to proclaim the Word in such a way that you see yourself as you truly are. That you see yourself as God sees you. I think this is why a church such as ours will always remain unpopular in our culture. Nobody likes to stand naked in front of a mirror like that. No one wants to stand naked before others and especially before our God—fig leaves anyone? That's why, I think, people gravitate towards churches that don't preach as we do. People like to be told they're basically good (a decidedly unscriptural notion) and just need a little push here and a nudge there—a few steps of self-help will do quite nicely, thank you. We like to be told we look good in fig.

Perhaps one reason for this is that the cross seems so remote. That again is another task of the preacher. In a sense, another part of the preaching task is to take the historical event of the crucifixion of our Lord and place you there. We, if you will, need to help you see that this horribly good event is your event. It was done for you. It was necessary for you. This is how the Son sets you free. We are tasked with helping you see (as the Spirit works through our words) that the freedom you enjoy in Christ cost something. Somebody did something for you that makes joy, peace, and hope not just possible but a reality. This is why St. Paul writes, "For I decided to know nothing among you except Jesus Christ and him crucified" (1 Corinthians 2:2). We pastors are to remind you, as we preach in our apostolic church, that your freedom came at a terrible cost. Blood was spilled. Spilled for you. Hopefully, as we all hear those words of Christ's sacrifice, we don't take our freedom for granted, but use it to serve the Lord as we sacrifice ourselves for our neighbors.

As we turn the calendar and celebrate another year of independence—another year of freedom—I think about these things. I was born into a nation, and a world, that has been blessed with relative peace. Wars that have occurred in my lifetime have, thankfully, been remote. I enjoyed a wonderful childhood, romping about neighborhoods, slogging through ponds, enduring the joys and heartbreaks of childhood romances. I have been able to roam about a vast nation, and even the planet, exploring its various cultures, foods, and beauty. Yet, the ability to do such things didn't just happen. It was made possible by the sacrifice of others. So remote, however, are those actions that it fails to register.

This June just passed we noted as a nation that it has been eighty years since thousands of young men stormed a once quiet coast in France. For so many, that was their last taste of saltwater and the feel of sand. No opportunity to say goodbye and grasp the hand of someone dearly loved as the last of life bled from their bodies. Yet, they did it. And those who survived and climbed from that beach went on to confront other horrors. Camps filled with people also created in the image of God, waiting to be exterminated. Perhaps, even after enduring unspeakable terrors, they finally understood, in a way we can only thank them for now, that if there was ever a war that needed to be fought and won it was that one. The War. It ended. And it ended, at least for a time, a thought that a fellow human being—a neighbor—should be exterminated. Those who fought handed to us in the West what has become known as the Great Peace. We have, most of us, grown up under the banner of that peace. Yet, we, as time has passed, seem to have forgotten what that peace cost.

So it seems to be with our salvation. We seem to have forgotten our freedom—freedom from death, freedom from the wrath we deserve—came at such a great cost. We should return—repent—and count up the cost. A cost borne by another. And as we think about the cost of this gift, we need look to our neighbor. This is what our Lord would have us do with our freedom. We use it to serve others as He served us. We sacrifice ourselves for others as He sacrificed Himself for us. Our Lord uses us to be the salt and the light amongst the neighbors where we are placed—where we live our little lives. In this we will find the crosses we are to bear. And we will fail. Fear will often overcome us. We will be afraid to lose our station and comfort within a community and family. But bear them we must. Our neighbors and communities need the gift of Christ we carry. We remember that our freedom in Christ is used not for our gratification but to help and benefit those around us. Yet, each week He gathers us to shower us, once again, with His grace and forgiveness. And He feeds and strengthens us for the week ahead. And, once again, out we go.

Perhaps we're overwhelmed. What can we do? Who among God's people is able to stand against such a tidal wave of evil and lawlessness. What can one do? Yet, remember, God is with us, working through us according to His good and gracious will. Thy will be done! Even in your little corner of the world, God is working—even in your failures. And not just you but countless saints are used by Him across place and time to be instruments of that divine will. Yes, in you, for one neighbor at a time, God is working to bring about His freedom for all.

The battle which has already been won, from our point of view, rages on. But don't lose heart. He is victorious. And you are free. Truly!

While that hardly seems exciting (especially for us since a lot of work will be required), the new software is specifically designed for church extension funds. It is already used by our other district-based LCMS church extension funds.

With this new software, we can provide you with a better experience and more efficient service. What is exciting for you is that you will soon be able to view your account and transactions from your computer and your phone!!! While we are not allowing transactions to be processed online to protect your investments from cybersecurity concerns, better, you will be able to view and print information on your account at any time from your computer or phone!

We've already begun converting to the new software, so please be patient with us as we become more familiar with it. In the next month or two, we should be rolling out online computer and phone access. STAY TUNED.

Apply for Dollar for Mission funds in 2025: All CID congregations are invited to submit proposals for projects to be funded with 2025 Dollar for Mission funds. CID BOARD OF DIRECTORS REVIEW REPORT 05/28/24

Rev. Burdick provided an evangelism-themed devotion from Mark 5

- Rev. David Dunlop gave his Mission Presentation on prison ministry at Logan Correctional Center in Lincoln, IL. He spoke personally of the despair and loneliness that inmates face. Rev. Dunlop wants to be a "broken record" of the Gospel of Jesus Christ, repeating the Gospel all the time. Rev. Dunlop is thankful for CID's support of the prison ministry, saying, "When I go to the prison, everyone in CID is going with me."
- Rev. Mohr gave his president's report with gratitude for congregations having received candidates from both seminaries to fill a portion of the vacancies in CID.
- The 2025 CID Convention is scheduled for July 13-15 at Crown Plaza, Springfield. Planning is underway.
- President Mohr is also planning a joint meeting with the Board of Directors and Circuit Visitors when Synod officials visit CID in September.
- <u>Church Extension Fund actively supports our congregations and CID members with loans, investments, and grants.</u> In April, CEF approved two Ministry Outreach Grant requests to help with Evangelism efforts.
- Dr. Schurb displayed statistical maps showing CID potential by county for New Church Starts.
- It was noted that only 1/6th of CID congregations have participated in Dollars for Missions. Consider discussing this
 and your congregation's Mission Offerings to CID, to continue to support all the ongoing work of the LCMS in our
 district.

The next CID Board of Directors meeting was set for Sept. 24th, 2024.

The Rewards of Godliness

It's no secret that you can't bribe your way into heaven. No amount of good works will impress God enough to open heaven's door for their sake. "For the wages of sin is death" (Rom. 6:23) and the person who "keeps the whole law but fails in one point has become guilty of all of it" (James 2:10). Rather, salvation is "the free gift of God ... in Christ Jesus" (Rom. 6:23).

So, your good works won't earn you the reward of heaven. But does that mean that there are no rewards at all? Consider what the Small Catechism says in the "Close of the Commandments":

What does God say about all these commandments?

He says, "I, the LORD your God, am a jealous God, punishing the children for the sin of the fathers to the third and fourth generation of those who hate Me, but showing love to a thousand generations of those who love Me and keep My commandments." (Ex. 20:5–6)

What does this mean?

God threatens to punish all who break these commandments. Therefore, we should fear His wrath and not do anything against them. But He promises grace and every blessing to all who keep these commandments. Therefore, we should also love and trust in Him and gladly do what He commands. (SC II)

God promises to bless you in keeping His commandments. What might these blessings be? Well, consider what Paul says about keeping the Fourth Commandment: "Children, obey your parents in the Lord, for this is right. 'Honor your father and mother' (this is the first commandment with a promise), 'that it may go well with you and that you may live long in the land'" (Eph. 6:1–3).

And think about what your life would be like if you went around stealing (breaking the Seventh Commandment), telling lies about people (breaking the Eighth Commandment), and generally being cruel to those around you (breaking all the commandments!). That is obviously not a blessed way to live. In fact, you'd be miserable living that way.

And Jesus says more about what is in store for those who make sacrifices for His sake: "Jesus said to them, 'Truly, I say to you, in the new world, when the Son of Man will sit on His glorious throne, you who have followed Me will also sit on twelve thrones, judging the twelve tribes of Israel. And everyone who has left houses or brothers or sisters or father or mother or children or lands, for My name's sake, will receive a hundredfold and will inherit eternal life'" (Matt. 19:28–29).

So don't grow impatient in doing good. Follow the Lord who has freely given you everlasting life.

Liberty in Christ.

July 4th is Independence Day for the United States of America, and I am sure you celebrate it. Mexico has



an Independence Day, also.

The citizens of Mexico all over the world relive the night of September 15th, 1810 when the parish priest, Miguel Hidalgo, called on his townspeople to take arms against the Spaniards who had been ruling Mexico since the days of the Conquest in 1521.

El Grito (The Shout), every 16th of September is the Mexican Fiesta par

excellence! Streets, houses, buildings and cars are decorated everywhere in the country. On every street corner there are vendors selling flags, balloons, and hats, all with green, white and red, the national colors. Flags wave from practically every house and building.

It is customary for the current President to deliver The Grito at the National Palace in Mexico City. The original bell rung by Hidalgo is the bell that is rung every 16th of September. The ceremony reaches the high point when the crowd joins in proudly shouting out the names of the heroes of Independence and ends with the exciting: Viva Mexico!

When The Grito ceremony ends, the sky lights up with multicolored fireworks that shower hearts with the pride of knowing that Mexico is a free and independent nation.

Why I am talking about liberty? Just read Galatians 5:1 "It is for freedom that Christ has set us free. Stand firm, then, and do not let yourselves be burdened again by a yoke of slavery."

We have the true liberty in Christ for these reasons:

Because of His love for us, He suffered and died on the cross. Because of this we are now His children. His suffering, death and resurrection have reconciled us with God, our sins having been forgiven; and we now are filled with His peace. While we were yet sinners, Christ died for us thus securing forgiveness for our sins and eternal salvation. It is by grace through faith in Christ's redeeming work that we obtain this salvation.

Nations may celebrate their Independence Day on a determined day, but for the children of God, liberty is constant! Every day in Christ we have real liberty from our sins, eternal death and hell. This liberty is ours **13** | P a g e

because of Jesus. When we believe His promises, we do not proclaim liberty for just one special day, but for all eternity.

Prison Ministry. During the study of the book, 100 Bible stories, the gentlemen are very attentive and filled with joy. Sometimes they even ask questions about infant baptism, sin, salvation by works, keeping the Sabbath, etc.

I have seen the need to answer them as clearly as possible and in a way that they can assimilate. Let us remember that many of them grew up in the Roman Catholic Church where they learned very little about the Bible and even less about the true teachings of God's Word.

It should be added that there are also gentlemen in the group who have Pentecostal beliefs and so it is with them that I spend more time showing the correct interpretation of Scripture, always showing Christian love without falling into doctrinal controversy.

The LWML CID has provided additional 100 Bible Stories books which will be given to a gentleman when he is released from the correctional center. Chaplain Weber will do this. With the donated book comes information about LCMS Hispanic ministries in the Chicago area and surrounding communities. Some of the gentlemen have the option of purchasing a radio and listening to the program on KALA, which I do on Saturdays from 7-8 am.

After different estimates, which are very expensive, CR church members have decided to cancel the asphalt project in the garage and rear parking lot areas. During the summer season members plan to do the work themselves doing it the same way they did on the front parking lot two years ago. This involves using buckets of sealers.

Be assured that our Almighty God is at work at Cristo Rey! He is saving souls and building His church! All praise be to Him!
