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Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ:

Over the last few Lenten and Easter seasons, this picture and accompanying caption have made the rounds on social media. Of course, it's making an argument. And, so as not to mince words, the argument

is garbage. (Note my eschewing of salty sailor language, which is what this deserves.) Before you continue, take a moment and read the caption and try to identify the very poor argument(s). You will have my admiration if you can do so.¹

What I find interesting for our purposes is this: The caption argues that the only thing necessary for salvation is "believing." Now I'll certainly concede that "one is justified by faith apart from works of the *law*."² But I add this question: What is "believing" or faith? The thief on the cross was in the presence of Christ in a way we cannot be. To his side was the Word made flesh. He could see God in Christ. He could hear, directly, the words Christ was saying, such as "It is finished."³ After the hanging thief asks our Lord to remember him, Christ could turn His head and look at this man and say those famous words, "Truly, I say to you, today you will be with me in *paradise*."⁴ Seeing is believing.

But what about us? What about those who cannot see? In the ancient sermon we title simply as "Hebrews" we hear the following: "Now faith is the assurance of things hoped for, the conviction of things not



How does the thief on the cross fit into your theology? No baptism, no communion, no confirmation, no speaking in tongues, no mission trip, no volunteerism, no financial gifts, and no church clothes. He couldn't even bend his knees to pray. He didn't say the sinner's prayer and among other things, he was a thief. Jesus didn't take way his pain, heal his body, or smite his scoffers. Yet, it was a thief who walked into paradise the same day as Jesus simply by BELIEVING.

He had nothing more to offer other than his belief that Jesus was who He said He was. No spin from brilliant theologians. No ego or arrogance. No shiny lights, skinny jeans, or crafty words. No fog machine, donuts, or coffee in the lobby. Just a naked dying man on a cross unable to even fold his hands to pray. "For God so loved the world that He gave His only begotten Son so that whoever BELIEVES in Him shall not perish but have everlasting life." (John 3:16) That is good news, that is Gospel!

*seen.*⁵ That's where Baptism, Communion, Holy Absolution, theology and doctrine enter in—the things dismissed in the caption. These are all gifts of Christ and His Word. Let me repeat that: these things a given to us by Scripture. And they are the things, the means, He gives us to create and sustain faith in us until that day we no longer need faith—that day when we finally see Him. Theology and doctrine—or dogma—are simply the truths given to us in the Word. We have theology and

doctrine regarding Baptism and the Lord's Supper since Christ speaks of these things—why we do them and what they are. We do these things, confess these things, cling to these things for so our Lord tells us. And if you'll indulge me for a moment, I also want to add a bit about that word "assurance." The word from which it is derived simply means to "stand under." Luther favored using the phrase "sure confidence" to capture its meaning. I think that's a little more concrete than assurance. We live in the sure confidence of hope of a life to come, that our death will not be the final word of our stories. Why? What is the source of this sure confidence? It is Christ. And He tells us. He gives us His Word. And from that Word, which is the history of our salvation in Christ, our confidence is sure as it rests on what He says, what He did. That's the beginning and end of theology and doctrine: to uphold and hand over faithfully what He gives us. That is the essence of believing, or faith. It is to say "Amen" when the Lord speaks and to live our lives under those promises. This we do as we gather and hear His Word and receive His blessed sacraments each week.

You see then, the issue I have with the image and its caption is summarized in the phrase "your theology." It's not my theology but Christ's. To dismiss that is to make myself lord over God's Word. It's this thought that lurks behind the picture's caption. The writer of the caption has decided that his theology is correct. How nicely convenient. However, the issue is simply that the writer's argument is not scriptural.

As noted above, what happened to the thief on the cross is not the situation in which we find ourselves. The point of that episode in the Church's history is to demonstrate the amazing depth of God's grace. It makes no dogmatic statement on how that grace is imparted to *you*. And I'll add that to dismiss Baptism and the Lord's Supper is immensely problematic. Christ our Lord commands these things. To dismiss them necessarily requires an authority greater than Christ. Good luck with that!

Now, it's certainly true one may believe and not be baptized nor receive the Sacrament and still be saved. The difference is this: One may receive the Word yet not have the opportunity to be baptized or receive Holy Communion before his death. Think of the adult who, though formerly a pagan, comes and receives the Word with gladness each week and begins the process that leads to Baptism and the Sacrament. We call that Adult Catechesis. The Lord forbid, but if that person dies before Baptism, they would still be under the banner of God's grace—like the thief on the cross. However, it is a much different situation when one rejects Baptism and the Lord's Supper. And that is my issue with the picture's caption.

I have noted throughout my years as a pastor, that many of us Lutherans have pitched our tents near the error of this caption. We Lutherans are so quick to defer. Instead of defending what we confess about Baptism, the Lord's Supper, and theology and doctrine, we convince ourselves that these things don't matter—which is exactly what this picture's caption does. We remain silent—or worse, we applaud this type of teaching. Ask yourselves as you participate in functions of other confessions if they would defer to your confession. I have observed that the answer is no, they wouldn't. I respect that. But we need to do the same. We must not convince ourselves that we all believe and confess the same things. We do not. And the differences are not so small.

Think about that caption again. Ultimately, the thinking it puts forward places the burden on you. How much belief saves? Do you believe enough? However, the focus of the actual event recorded by St. Luke is Christ—what He says. After the Lord speaks those words, there is no mention of the thief's response. The focus is Christ, not us. How do you know you are saved? He tells you how. You are Baptized. And, according to what He says, it is Baptism that makes you a disciple. And that's the issue. There is no inconsistency in what our Lord gives to us. Either Baptism saves or it doesn't. Both positions cannot be true. This is where you can clearly see the difference in confessions. You can see it in how a particular confession speaks and teaches about the sacraments. You can see the difference in beliefs in how this question is answered: How do you know you are saved?

I add that you do no service to your neighbor when you choose not to confess but instead defer to his or her confession. Remember, your friends are caught in a theology that has strayed from Scripture. They are caught in a theology that robs them of the comfort and peace Christ intends for them—a peace that is found in the words "today you will be with me in paradise." I also remind you that you are the salt of the earth. You carry Christ with you wherever you go. And that also compels you to confess. When we decide to remain silent and reduce the faith to a caption, our Lord has something to say about that: "Salt is good, but if salt has lost its taste, how shall its saltiness be restored? It is of no use either for the soil or for the manure pile. It is thrown away. He who has ears to hear, let him hear."⁶ You and I owe it to our neighbors—people we love—to speak the truth. We need to repent of so watering down our confession that we end up confessing nothing. And we need to stop deferring to other confessions. We have the Truth. They embrace error. Yes, that's a bold and jarring statement. But it happens to be true.

And finally, remember what I wrote to you last month—we are called to be faithful to Christ. We are called to be faithful to Christ and, specifically, to His Word that reveals Him to us—all of it.

And he said to all, "If anyone would come after me, let him deny himself and take up his cross daily and follow me. For whoever would save his life will lose it, but whoever loses his life for my sake will save it. For what does it profit a man if he gains the whole world and loses or forfeits himself? For whoever is ashamed of me and of my words, of him will the Son of Man be ashamed when he comes in his glory and the glory of the Father and of the holy angels.⁷

I pray the Lord bless us with wisdom, strength, and a good measure of His Spirit in these dark and latter days.

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A long time ago, a close Christian friend of mine told me this true story:

His church had a choir with many singers. Before each practice, the choral director invited a choir member to pray. Everybody was given the opportunity. Once he pointed to a lady who was active in the church, and asked her to pray. Everyone bowed their heads and closed their eyes waiting for her to pray. To everyone's surprise, she started to cry. The director asked if she was okay. The lady responded, "I don't know how to pray".

This is not an isolated case, because it's true that many Christians do not pray regularly. Sadly, there are many Christians who say they are too busy to find the time to pray and show respect and gratitude to their Lord.

When I worshiped at Good Shepherd Lutheran Church in McAllen, TX., an old man approached me and said, "Pastor, my family prays for you and your ministry once a week".

When I was doing my hospital chaplain duties a few years ago, I visited a patient, and while having a nice visit with him, he asked me to pray for me.

It's very gratifying to hear that other people pray for you. Even Jesus prayed for us: "I pray also for those who will believe in me through their message". (John 17:1)



The Apostle Paul exhorts us to pray: "I urge, then, first, that petitions, prayers, intercession and thanksgiving be made for all people." (1 Timothy 2:1)

God's Instruments, God's Stewards

For we are his workmanship, created in Christ Jesus for good works, which God prepared beforehand, that we should walk in them. (Eph. 2:10)

Some pastors refer to these words as "the most forgotten words in the Scriptures." They are forgotten because they follow the familiar and critical words before it. The preceding two verses that overshadow Ephesians 2:10 are words of justification: "For by grace you have been saved through faith. And this is not your own doing; it is the gift of God, not a result of works, so that no one may boast" (Eph. 2:8–9). These are words preached regularly. They are assigned as confirmation verses. They carry with them the very heart of what it means to be a redeemed child of God!

Precisely because the previous verses are so central to salvation, they often overpower our practice of stewardship! We have been saved by grace. This is certain and sure because of Jesus. Works play no role in our salvation. No credit taking for us! Grace is freely given. Faith is miraculously created by the Spirit and joyously received. This truth is so wonderful and so encompassing that we often miss out on WHY we are redeemed.

The grace of God revealed in Jesus calls us to faith. But St. Paul doesn't stop with grace and faith. He continues to the logical conclusion. Just like the creation declares the handiwork of God, the redemption of sinners like you and me declares His greatest handiwork! Redeemed stewards are created to reflect the grace and mercy God showers on us to others.

As Lutherans, we understand that good works flow from faith in Jesus Christ. They are the fruit of the tree of salvation into which we have been grafted by grace. Sanctification and stewardship are both on-going and active confessions of what the Lord has done in us. These works are not always spectacular. Many times, they are simply parents showing Jesus to their children. They are compassionate actions that live out the truth of the Gospel to co-workers and even complete strangers. While they can be grand endeavors, more likely they are simple, beautiful works which highlight what Jesus has done in us.

These works aren't random either. They have been planned by God. God planned to use you as a faithful steward as you walk the road that leads you through your daily life. There are no chance encounters or coincidences. They have been planned by the Lord of the universe for the benefit of His creation. Good works are what point to God's greatest work: Jesus!

He calls you and me to walk in this faith, which flows from this grace, which has been poured out on us in Jesus. But even this is not to our credit. We are simply called to be faithful stewards of God's grace so that we may share it with those who need is as much as we do. God's Spirit carries us along in this. We are just the steward — the instrument in His hand to accomplish His plan and glorify Him
