From the Pastor's Desk – May 2025



Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ:

What is truth?

So Pilate entered his headquarters again and called Jesus and said to him, "Are you the King of the Jews?" Jesus answered, "Do you say this of your own accord, or did others say it to you about me?" Pilate answered, "Am I a Jew? Your own nation and the chief priests have delivered you over to me. What have you done?" Jesus answered, "My kingdom is not of this world. If my kingdom were of this world, my servants would have been fighting, that I might not be delivered over to the Jews. But my kingdom is not from the world." Then Pilate said to him, "So you are a king?" Jesus answered, "You say that I am a king. For this purpose I was born and for this purpose I have come into the world—to bear witness to the truth. Everyone who is of the truth listens to my voice." Pilate said to him, "What is truth?" (John 18:33-38).

What is truth? So Pilate half asks, half asserts as he listens to (unbeknownst to him and so many others) his Creator testify before him. Who knows what inner turmoil and suspension of personal values Pilate engaged in while climbing the political ladder. I imagine brutal governments require brutal people to fill their various posts. I do know that if Pilate's performance as governor of Judea did not satisfy Rome, his life would be required. So, there's that. It's easy then to understand how, after he hears Jesus speak, he would utter those words: "What is truth?"

Sadly, we so often ask the same question. There are so many voices in our ears. Which one is correct? Who should we listen to? Where is the truth? How can we, when presented with the same facts, people, parties, organizations, and the media, arrive at so many different conclusions? Group A says esteemed leader is evil personified, while Group B portrays esteemed leader in glowing, halo-esque light and tolerates no dissenting opinions. How are we to make sense of such things as God's people? What is truth? Group A says Baptism saves, while Group B says it is a work you do to demonstrate your submission to God. It's the same with the Lord's Supper. So, you may ask, what is truth?

We confess that indeed there is a truth, and that the truth can be known. And we know it is found in the person of Jesus Christ. He says about Himself: *"I am the way, and the truth, and the life. No one comes to the Father except through me"* (John 14:6). Jesus is the Truth. Standing before Pilate was the answer to Pilate's question. Yet

Pilate refused to see it. The way Pilate viewed the world—or using the twenty-dollar word: his *epistemology*—kept his eyes closed to the truth.

So often we also refuse to see the truth. Yet it is there. The truth about who we are —particularly who we are as we stand before God—is there. As is the truth about God in so far as He reveals Himself to us. And there is the truth about life in this fallen world. These are all put before us in Christ our Lord and His Holy Word. Yet our worldview might get in the way of seeing the truth. For instance, if your starting point when it comes to salvation is that you must do something, such as accepting Christ as your personal Lord and Savior, you will not see the truth of what Baptism does. You will not understand, and as a result, you will eschew and empty the Sacraments of their true meaning and power. Your worldview, your epistemology, should be based on Scripture, what Christ says about Scripture (what He says about Himself), and the Creeds. The Creeds act, if you will, as guard-rails to help keep us focused properly on Scripture. Along with that is what you and I confess about Scripture. Is it the Word of God? Or does Scripture merely contain that Word of God? (That phrase right there explains the vast chasm between what we confess and what has become of the ELCA.) All these things—our view of Scripture and the Creeds—help us silence the outside voices and influences, understand Scripture, and see the truth.

So, again we ask, what is truth?

Think about the truth of what Jesus says as He stands before Pilate. He says "...My kingdom is not of this world." That's a truth we would do well to remember. And it would also do us some good to remember that we are heirs of that kingdom. That's what your Baptism does. You, in Baptism, are buried and born again in Christ. And that makes you an heir. The glories of that kingdom now await you. Your kingdom is not of this world.

Funny that we look for heaven on earth here, now. Or to be a bit more precise, we desire to make where we find ourselves now a heavenly place. The problem is that we each have our own ideas of what heaven should be most of those ideas not being based on Scripture. We know what we the Baptized are now—it is surety sealed by the blood of Christ. But we do not yet see it. We are waiting for that day, that moment, when we will see and know fully what our Lord has done for us. But not yet.

Pilate could see no way out of his political dilemma and his fluid understanding of truth offered no assistance. He could see no way to preserve his place in this fallen world, and so he washed his hands of the whole affair. *O felix culpa*! O happy guilt! Pilate's actions sealed our Lord's fate. A fate He willingly, for you, accepted. His death means forgiveness and life for Pilate in his cowardice, Judas in his betrayal, Peter in his denial, and you in your sin and weakness. The death of Christ brings forgiveness and life for all (though not all will want this great gift). The gift is for you. The forgiveness is for you. The life is for you. This is the truth!

Our hope, our life, is not found in Pilate or any political leader (a very good bit of truth to remember). And if the Lord Almighty could use a hack despot like Pilate and the pagan Roman Empire to accomplish the most wonderful bit of Good News in all of history, be assured that He can work His good and holy will today—even in the midst of so much confusion and suffering. What we are, the hope we have, the way we see ourselves and the world, is found in Christ. That is the Truth.

LCMS NEWS - Stewardship in the Body of Christ

Baseball season is upon us. The southern images of spring training give way to the pageantry of Opening Day. On that day, the hopes and dreams of every major league team, player and fan focus on doing whatever it takes to get to the Fall Classic, the World Series. Baseball is a secular way that so many of us confess that hope "springs" eternal.

With all of this in mind, baseball can also teach us a new perspective about stewardship. Think about the game itself. Baseball is a team sport. The home team faces off against the visitors. Yet while it is a team game, there are repetitive, individual confrontations that take place within the game. The baseball game cannot start without the individual pitcher against the hitter. Once the batted ball is in play, the battle is between the ability of the fielder against the speed of the baserunner. Once there is a runner on base, an attempt to steal a base pits the runner against the catcher. A base hit into the outfield pits the outfielder against a runner trying to score.

Baseball is a team game with many smaller units at play. Without all those smaller units working together and achieving their tasks, the team will lose.

Romans 12 puts our stewardship of the Gospel in a similar setting. The church is certainly described as a team, if you will.

Verse 3: "For by the grace given to me I say to everyone among you not to think of himself more highly than he ought to think, but to think with sober judgment, each according to the measure of faith that God has assigned." This is where the Body of Christ is really seen as a team. No one member of the baseball team can win the game by themselves. In the same way, no one part of the Body of Christ can accomplish stewardship of the Gospel alone. The pastor cannot. The congregational chair cannot. The lead soprano in the choir cannot. But each of these individuals have been added to the local congregation to be built into a team that can win the victory with Jesus.

Verses 4–5: "For as in one body we have many members, and the members do not all have the same function, so we, though many, are one body in Christ, and individually members one of another." In baseball, the pitcher pitches. The catcher catches. The hitter hits. When a pitcher attempts to hit, the result is usually not very pretty. Catchers often do not excel at running the bases. The hitter usually does not do well when they are sent to the mound to pitch. Every

member of the Body of Christ has a unique set of abilities and functions. Not everyone preaches. Not everyone leads. Not everyone sings well. Yet when the congregation assembles together as a team, it can succeed in ways unattainable by the individual.

Verses 6–8: "Having gifts that differ according to the grace given to us, let us use them: if prophecy, in proportion to our faith; if service, in our serving; the one who teaches, in his teaching; the one who exhorts, in his exhortation; the one who contributes, in generosity; the one who leads, with zeal; the one who does acts of mercy, with cheerfulness." Each member of the team has a role to play. Abilities and opportunities are entrusted to the individual members of the Body of Christ to be used for the ultimate purpose of stewarding the Gospel for the glory of God and the benefit of the neighbor. The one preaching is no more or less important than the others. The one serving or the one teaching, the leader or the merciful one — all are equally important in the faithful stewardship of all that the Lord has entrusted to the Body of Christ. All this stewardship is for the sake of the other!

A baseball team can have five All-Star pitchers but cannot win if the hitters do not hit. The best lineup in the league will struggle if the pitchers cannot get anyone on the other team out. Pitchers need the defense behind them to play well. Coaches need to lead well. When they all work together, you have a winning baseball team. When the Body of Christ has all its members faithfully stewarding the unique individual talents that have been entrusted to them, the victory goes to Jesus! This is the goal of faithful stewardship! It is all about Jesus!

Jesus' Resurrection Is a Real Fact.

The Holy Scriptures tell us that many saw Jesus alive. This included Mary Magdalene, Mary the mother of James, Salome (Mat.28; Mar.16), Joanna and the others with them. (Luke. 24:10). In addition, the disciples (Mar.16:14; John 20:19-29), Cleopas and the other disciple (Luke 24:13-35), more five hundred at the same time (1Cor.15:6), and lastly, the apostle Paul (1Cor.15:8) saw the Risen Christ.

Christ's resurrection is a real fact! The apostles gave constant testimony about it, and it was the central theme of their entire preaching. Acts 4:33 and Acts 5:40-42 says: "They called the apostles in and had them flogged. Then they ordered them not to speak in the name of Jesus, and let them go. We can become discouraged when work and income are not easy to find. We can be filled with hatred and anger against those who hurt us. How can we smile when the wind is against us? At these times, is God our ever present source of help and comfort?

It's my prayer that you continue faithful in serving our Lord. Have you been affronted because of Jesus' name? If the answer is yes, remember to trust in the Lord because nothing will extinguish the joy in your heart on having suffered for Christ's cause and for the preaching of the Gospel.



In Mexico Mothers' Day is always celebrated on May 10th. It is the most beloved and important festival of the year for the family. It is a tradition that the children sing songs to their mothers on this day. We call it "serenata". A serenata consists of songs sung in the early morning with live music. Some hire a group of musicians with acoustic guitars. Others employ "The Mariachi", (The Mariachi is a group of musicians who play traditional folk music with guitars, trumpets, and violins)

or friends with acoustic guitars may form a group and travel to their mothers' houses and sing two or three songs. Upon finishing the songs, the mother must leave the house and thank the children personally with a hug and a kiss.

On this day, the mothers also receive gifts: flowers, hugs, kisses and a lot of love from their children in appreciation. It is also a custom to observe festivals for the mothers in the elementary schools, where the students carry out dance numbers, interpret some songs and perform some recitations like poems for mothers. Mothers

are so pleased when they see their children doing something for them. In many schools the students do some handcrafts, like a decoration for the house for their mothers. Children give it to them on Mother's Day.

Many families are accustomed to being together to celebrate with their moms. They bring a special meal or some plates while others make reservations in a restaurant. The idea is to

spend major time with their moms in order to honor them on their special day. At Cristo Rey we are going to celebrate Mothers' Day.
