From the Pastor's Desk – November 2024



Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ:

Precious in the sight of the LORD is the death of his saints (Psalm 116:5).

Easter. Such a joyous day. A Feast. A Feast of life. Death is defeated—destroyed. Easter. The great Feast of the Resurrection. It all seems, however, a bit remote. All that happened there, then. We hear and think of that event as we do other reports. It's one news item amid many. And with a detracted interest we ponder. And then return to the actions and events of the day in our little lives. But then, just about halfway between the past and future celebrations of Easter, we observe another great feast of the Christian Church. On or very near the first day of November, we celebrate All Saints' Day. And we are reminded, taught, blessed...

It's been almost a decade. *That ol' clock, it never stop.* My siblings, an in-law or two, Mom, and a small shell of a once robust man layered in heavy socks, long johns, sweatshirt, flannel overshirt, and a knit wool cap gathered in the bright, sanitary room. The small man, Dad, sat on the paper-covered table, the layers of clothing simply hung on him. A child dressed in adult clothes. Dad never shied away from dressing for the occasion or the occasional neighborhood party—sometimes to the deep chagrin of his children. (We recall, with some redness of face, the outlet, plug, and lightbulb incident.) Had this been one of those times, there would have been laughter. But this was not one of those occasions.

Several months earlier news arrived of a recurrence. It was back, and the news was grim. In that news, the voice of the curse was heard. "In my beginning, is my end,"¹ T.S. Eliot would write. And indeed it is. In the very first breath of the newborn, there hides the death rattle waiting for its moment. Waiting to claim its prize. And there we were standing around the man seated on the examination table—a man who sat huddled for warmth under the weight of many yet insufficient layers of cloth. And we waited. The man, the room, cold lighting: harbingers of what was to come.

Entering, the doctor prepared to state aloud the news our eyes could already read. There was nothing left to be done. The doctor sat at dad's feet on that little stool with wheels found in every examination room. Rare was the time we gathered without laughter filling the spaces between words and glances. Now, only silence. And an unnatural coldness that seemed to come from within. Icy white light chilled the room from above and gave its testimony to the moment. A light from which no illness or age can hide. Two men faced each other. The words came in a British accent: "Palliative care." A sanitary way in a sanitary room of proclaiming death was imminent. The beginning would, in a few days, meet its end.

The tears, the first of many that would be shed, flowed—but not from dad. He, the smile—Dad's smile—still gracing his hollow face, with disease-thinned hands clasped the doctor's face. Lifting his face until their eyes met, he simply said, "It's okay."

For those of you who fret over always having the right words to give proper witness, there is *the* witness. A lifetime of receiving the gift of Christ each Lord's Day prepared that man, my father, with two words to powerfully witness to the hope within him. Christ saw to it that my father's story did not end with his last breath a few days later. He, like all the saints in Christ who had gone before him, now rests in the arms of the Lord. He now awaits the resurrection—his resurrection—awaking from that little bed that rests beneath a few feet of soil on the southwest side of Chicago.

Death is always lurking. For many, it's a long, slow slide down into its gaping maw. For others it's a trap that's sprung—jumping upon the victim unsuspecting and sometimes ill-prepared. But All Saints' Day... This great feast day takes the gift of Easter and places it right in our laps. We will read names on that day—the names of those we love who sat among us receiving the Gifts each Sunday. And the bell will toll. It will toll, not as a doleful note of death but as a herald of life—everlasting life. You see, All Saints' Day reminds us in a very tangible and personal way that Easter—the Resurrection of our Lord—is for us. Here. Now. It reminds us with promises. It reminds us with promises spoken by the Lord, lived by the Lord. It reminds us that sin and the curse of death have been put to death, and that the promises are fulfilled in the risen Christ. And the promise of that day is that those dear departed loved ones will again see our faces. It is a reminder that our parting is temporary. It is Easter lived among us. It is a bold, in-your-face, "O Death where is your victory?" reminder that the Christ's victory over death is our victory over death. His resurrection is our resurrection. His life, our life.

This is the work we are about in this place we call Immanuel. And actually, we celebrate Easter, All Saints' Day, and Christmas each and every Sunday. We participate in, partake of the God in Christ who was born into our flesh. We celebrate, participate in, partake of His resurrected body as we celebrate the Holy Eucharist. And as we gather for that feast, we are reminded that those who have gone before us—died in the Faith—are seated at the unending Marriage Feast of the Lamb. For a moment, their voices are mingled with ours as we sing those God-given words—canticles—that we know are also sung by them. "Holy, Holy, Holy..." and "Glory be to God on high." Those words sung by the heavenly host—Dad. And one day soon our voices will join that unending chorus.

T.S. Eliot would end his poem *East Coker* by reversing the words with which he began. Six simple words that so sublimely capture the gift that is ours in Christ: "In my end is my beginning."² All Saints Day reminds us, in a way that's so tangible, that death is not the final word. In that end is the beginning of a new, eternal life, where the Lord Himself will wipe the tears from our eyes. I like to think about that. Our Creator and Redeemer removing our tears then, perhaps, with a sweet smile, He directs our attention to those standing around us. And the joyous reunion will get underway—a reunion that never need be repeated. And if there remain there any tears, they will only be tears of joy.

You have turned for me my mourning into dancing;

you have loosed my sackcloth and clothed me with gladness, that my glory may sing your praise and not be silent. O LORD my God, I will give thanks to you forever! (Psalm 30:11-12).

P.S. What follows are the words I wrote on the day of my father's death, February 7, A.D. 2015. See you soon, Dad.

About two thousand years ago a particular and peculiar Man did something that this day affected my life in a profound way. Because of Him I have peace and hope: Peace because I am forgiven and the hope of a joyful reunion with those called from me in this sorrow-filled life. Today I give thanks for this Man (who also happened to be God) as almost two thousand years ago He defeated what would come to my family this day: death. Because of Christ, today of all days, we have peace. Today of all days we have hope. Thanks be to God through Christ our Lord for His victory over death and the grave. Thank you, Lord, for calling my father through the water of Your Holy Baptism to this victory. I look forward to the day when, by His Grace, I will again stand alongside my dad proclaiming the glorious victory of Christ our Lord. *"Fear not, I am the first and the last, and the living one. I died, and behold I am alive forevermore, and I have the keys of Death and Hades"* (Revelation 1:17-18).

The consequences of shallow thankfulness

Can you imagine a Thanksgiving dinner without turkey, mashed potatoes, gravy and pumpkin pie? I know I can't! To not have these on the menu, or worse, to run out of them with the family around the table, would be a culinary sin of epic proportions. An attempt to serve bratwurst and hamburgers in place of the standard fare would ring hollow and seem totally inappropriate and out of place. It isn't that the food would be bad; brats and burgers are pretty tasty. But not for Thanksgiving — they just don't go together!

This month, as we continue to walk through the stewardship hymn, "Forgive Us, Lord, for Shallow Thankfulness" (LSB 788), we turn our attention to verse three. Here, William Watkins Reid, Sr., the man who penned this text, draws attention to some things that do not go along with faithful, thankful stewardship.

Forgive us, Lord, for selfish thanks and praise ...

We see this often with small children. They greedily snatch the candy out of a grandparent's hand, savagely destroy the wrapper, and attempt to stuff the entire delicacy in their mouth in one bite, only to have a parent say, "Tell grandma thank you." This is followed by the pro forma thanks that is uttered between chocolate chews. It isn't really thankfulness; it is simply checking a box to keep mom or dad off their backs.

We never really outgrow this either. Our shallow thankfulness takes the form of feigned humility when praise is being offered. We are thankful that our admirers noticed and called us out: "Look at me! Aren't I special?" No thought at all is given to the fact that the Lord was the One who gave us the ability and opportunity for accomplishment. Our false blush is really only masking our selfish, credit-seeking gain. Once again, we find ourselves idolatrously thanking ourselves.

For words that speak at variance with deeds ...

What carries more weight: words or action? The steward who gives voice to the Gospel in the Divine Service but then lives like a pagan in the world does great damage, not only to others but to the Gospel itself! This is the consequence of failed stewardship. It is idolatry that separates the steward from the Lord.

Worse yet, it also impacts others negatively. When the failed steward is the reference point outside the Christian community, there are those who want no part of being Christian or

following the Christ they claim. We see this play out in the impact of overt political activity among Christians based on governing policy as opposed to fidelity to the Word of God. When our lips and our lives are out of sync, like what used to happen with old movie projectors, the impact isn't funny — it obscures the Gospel!

Forgive our thanks for walking pleasant ways unmindful of a broken brother's need ...

Our creature comforts often become an obstacle to faithful stewardship. This is true of both individual and corporate stewardship. Financial stewardship is often limited by our desire to be comfortable and have the latest toys and gadgets. Congregational stewardship is often limited by the desire to focus on what is best for the congregation as opposed to how resources might be best stewarded to reach the community with the Gospel.

When we see someone in need, or broken by the world, we often look at them as freeloaders. We admonish them to get a job. We insist that they learn our language, learn our customs, and make them their own. But this gets in the way of seeing every human being the way that Jesus sees them. Remember, that broken person is one for whom Jesus went to the cross to die and rise. When we are unmindful of these needs, our shallow thankfulness also stands in the way of the Gospel.

This stanza reminds us of the challenge we face. Our hearts are master idol-makers. Our shallow thankfulness threatens our souls and hinders others from seeing Jesus as their Lord and Savior. Stewardship is serious business. It is a task for which we were created. In our sinful failings, we are never relieved of these duties. In our Baptism, we are restored to be stewards of the Gospel. Our faithful stewardship is all about that Gospel.

Forgive us when our thanks are shallow, O Lord! In this month of Thanksgiving, grant us the grace to offer heaping helpings of this stewardship so that others may see Jesus!

One ancient tradition which is growing stronger little by little among the Hispanics is the belief that dead people return to earth to visit people. There is a special day to mark this tradition. It is called The Day of the Dead (Día de Muertos), and it's held on Nov. 1st and 2nd. Many people believe that this great, ancient and historic tradition was started by the Indians before Spain's conquest. Actually, families decorate a special place in their home. This is called the Altar, where their dead love ones' pictures are displayed with candles, colorful papers, their favorite meals and beverages, skull candies, and bread (Death bread). They believe that their relatives return from the dead to enjoy these items. The media contribute to this with live coverage from homes and even cemeteries, where people spend entire nights decorating with flowers and candles. Do you find some similarities to Halloween?

Hispanics who live in the U. S. want to preserve this tradition, even right here in the United States. As Christians we must reject this false tradition. Please read 1 John 3: 1b-3 "The reason the world does not know us is that it did not know him. Dear friends, now we are children of God, and what we will be has not yet been made known. But we know that when Christ appears, we shall be like him, for we shall see him as he is. All who have this hope in him purify themselves, just as he is pure."

What true and amazing words we find in the Holy Scriptures! These words become a great comfort to all as we come to believe in Jesus Christ. The unbelievers may not believe at first what the words say, but Christians need to continue sharing and proclaiming the Good News in Christ. We're confident and we stand on what He says:

Once I heard this: "It's so good that you don't have any troubles. I'm sure, all of your family is so happy, because, as Christians, God takes care of you". Well, you and I know that this is not true at all. Believers in Christ have all kinds of troubles and we all suffer at one time or another. We have a long list of troubles, right? So, can we as Christians give thanks to God when we are going through a difficult time?

I'm going to share this true story. It's a story my grandma used to tell. In a very small town, there lived a faithful Christian man. Every day before the sun began to shine, he prayed. He prayed aloud, and everyone in the town was able to hear him. My Grandma said he never failed to pray. It didn't matter what kind of day it was, sunny or rainy, cold, or hot. He prayed with gratitude and thanksgiving. My grandma said that he never complained even though he worked hard as a farmer. He always gave thanks to God for all the gifts he received.

I'm happy when I see joyful, loving families. Their faces tell me that God has been blessing them and showing me how He protects them in their daily lives. They know God is with them in all the circumstances of life. I'm pretty sure these believers in Jesus will have a pleasant and happy Thanksgiving dinner.

What about you? Are you worried? Do you have troubles? Do you feel as though no one listens or cares about you? Think about what Saint Paul tells us in Philippians 4:6,7
