From the Pastor's Desk - November 2025

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ:

I don't feel like dancing. Or much like singing.

There was a time it wasn't so. Jitterbug? Yes. (My dad could really cut a rug.) The stately Waltz? Easy-peasy. And the elegant Fox-trot? Slow-slow-quick-quick-slow. And what was a family picnic without the Hokey-Pokey? Put your left foot in... And the family singing. Long before our earbuds and AirPods isolated us in public, we listened and sang together. Aunt Rita would sit at the piano and lead us as we sang and sang. And sang. A carload of teenagers belted out the hit du jour in rust-covered wheels as we coaxed those tired heaps around town. Yes, we sang. And we danced.

Maybe it was the jubilation that many of our parents and grandparents had come through the War. The "Great Peace" (a term coined by politicians, no doubt) was born. The bodies of sons and brothers returning from Vietnam and the full effects of post-war PTSD (results of that "Great Peace?) remained future events. And the baby-boom boomed along. Widespread use of the pill (approved for use in 1960) would come later, along with the horror of government and citizen-sanctioned abortion. (As an aside, the live birth rate is less than half of what it was during the boom. Remember that as you ponder, and perhaps blame others for, the shrinking church. We stopped having kids.)

Life was filled with joy and optimism. Maybe it was the result of seeing life through those rose-colored glasses of youth. Maybe. But things seem so different now. Perhaps it's the political darkness of a state like Illinois. Maybe it's because we kept, and keep, electing politicians that are shamelessly hostile to the Faith. I hear more than a few of God's people express a full-throated support for those officials that unflinchingly support death, and later these same folks kneel before God's holy altar to receive the body and blood of the Author of Life. What am I to make of that? Or do about that? I pray the Lion of the Tribe of Judah blesses me—and you—with His wisdom.

And, of course, we pastors are not immune to spiritual attack. The Father of Lies hates what we do in our church. And he hates what I preach. He desires us to worship the god of our emotions and imaginations. He wants us to worship the jesus of our ideations—the god we create for ourselves. Yes, he tempts us to worship ourselves. And many do. Many are the tales I have of people seated before me telling me what Jesus would and would not do (with little familiarity with the Word of Christ recorded for us). And no matter how I respond, they have convinced themselves I'm wrong and they're right. Spiritual attack is a very real thing.

So, yeah, I don't feel much like dancing. Or singing.

It's difficult to not be discouraged. Maybe it's because I have the habit of frequently checking my various "feeds." If you're not familiar with the term, it's tech-speak for monitoring the various on-line social media sites to which I subscribe (Facebook, X—formerly known as Twitter, Instagram—or simply Insta, and a host of local and national news outlets and podcasts). It's been years (you read that right) since I've tuned into the six o'clock news or read a newspaper actually printed on paper. Now I receive news via these outlets on my tech devices—chiefly my smart phone. I still subscribe to a small number of news magazines, all delivered to me electronically. These outlets also give me multiple alerts and items each day. Perhaps this behavior stems from my time at the seminary, many years ago now. There, one of my beloved professors taught us to carry the Bible under one arm and a newspaper under the other. His point was that we need to be familiar with current events in our communities and nation so we might address these events from a Christian point-of-view. Hence, my media consumption.

The not-so-technical term for this is "doom-scrolling." The algorithms that decide what shows up in our feeds are "tuned" to put negativity before us. Why? It sells. As much as we point the finger at our tech overlords, we must first point the finger at ourselves. What does it say about us that negativity generates dollars? Soap operas, fights on Maury Povich's depressing show, and a host of other negative diversions were all popular when Zuckerberg was stumbling around in diapers. These things say more about us than them. We like to wallow in the slop of our sties. We gossip about our neighbors—those people we were just kneeling next to as the manna from heaven was placed in our mouths. And we relish in it. And I hear it.

So, yeah, I don't feel much like dancing. Or singing.

But, thankfully, gratefully, the story continues.

Every Sunday, as we are given Christ through His Holy Word and the Blessed Sacrament, we are turned and pointed forward. We are pointed forward to what's already been accomplished by our Savior but too often seems unrealized for us. We are pointed forward to our life to come. We are reminded that we are sojourners here and that we are citizens of the Kingdom of Heaven. Yes, we are told, without sugar-coating it, that we will suffer—even as God's people—in this world. But we are also told of the reality we cannot yet see, yet a reality it is. At the Table of our Lord, we join all those saints who have gone before us. "With angels and archangels and with all the company of heaven..." Sometimes that's all we have to get us through—the promise of what's to come.

The psalm that follows, the Thirtieth Psalm, is a song written by King David for the dedication of the Temple—the place where God promised to be to bless His people. You will recognize it. From the day of its writing to this day, this psalm has occupied a place of prominence in our liturgical life. As the Temple was made obsolete by the Incarnation of our Lord, today God's presence occurs in the life of His church—God is with us. Hence, our name. In the psalm David reminds us of what happens as we come to the place where the Lord promises to be. David writes:

I will extol you, O LORD, for you have drawn me up and have not let my foes rejoice over me.

O LORD my God, I cried to you for help, and you have healed me.

O LORD, you have brought up my soul from Sheol; you restored me to life from among those who go down to the pit.

Sing praises to the LORD, O you his saints, and give thanks to his holy name.

For his anger is but for a moment,

and his favor is for a lifetime. Weeping may tarry for the night, but joy comes with the morning. As for me, I said in my prosperity, "I shall never be moved." By your favor, O LORD, you made my mountain stand strong; you hid your face; I was dismayed. To you, O LORD, I cry, and to the Lord I plead for mercy: "What profit is there in my death, if I go down to the pit? Will the dust praise you? Will it tell of your faithfulness? Hear, O LORD, and be merciful to me! O LORD, be my helper!" You have turned for me my mourning into dancing; you have loosed my sackcloth and clothed me with gladness, that my glory may sing your praise and not be silent. O LORD my God, I will give thanks to you forever!

Sometimes, it's all I have—all we have. We have the truth of what Christ has done and the promise of what will be. I think we all look forward to the day when our mourning is turned into dancing as we give thanks forever. We look forward to that unending marriage feast.

I think often of my grandmothers before they were called from this life—well advanced in years and wearing the evidence of a hard life a little too lived. They could only walk from here to there with assistance of mechanical devices and the arms of family. They had endured so much. The Great Depression, severe poverty, the violence of Prohibition-Era Chicago, the War, and short lives with tragic ends all shaped their lives. These women, indeed, were an earthy and tough lot. Yet, even as the hour of their deaths approached, I would often witness a Lourdes level "miracle." At every major family gathering, invariably a good polka would find its way in. (EVERY Chicago party band worth their salt would have, along with the current popular songs, a few polkas in their repertoire. It was a nonnegotiable for being hired.) Walkers, canes, wheelchairs cast aside; out my dear grandmothers went onto those dance floors. For a few moments, that lively dance drowned the pain of age and old memories. And for a moment, smiles graced the lined faces of old women. They were—are—God's people. And they also knew the promises of God. So, they danced. And sang.

The day will come when we all will dance and sing with a joy that cannot yet be grasped or diminished.

I will dance. And sing.

The Lord has spoken. It's all going to be okay.




From the Social Ministry Group:



Pointing to the Rock of Ages

Not the labor of my hands Can fulfill Thy Law's demands; Could my zeal no respite know, Could my tears forever flow, All for sin could not atone; Thou must save, and Thou alone. (LSB 761:2)

While the classic hymn "Rock of Ages" shows up in the Lutheran Service Book in the "Hope and Comfort" section, it can also teach us a valuable lesson about Christian stewardship. If that surprises you, stay with me on this one. No Lutheran would ever dispute the fact that our work does not save us. Ephesians 2 makes it truly clear that we are dead in our trespasses and sins and would remain in that state until Christ raises us by grace. There is not a ladder on which we can climb out of the grave that our sins have dug for us. No blood, sweat nor tears will be able to rescue us. We all know this.

Our works do not save. Christ's work on the cross of Calvary does! He bore human flesh. He carried the burden of our sin to the cross. His body was beaten, bruised and bloodied for us. He has indeed atoned for us! This is more than enough reason for this hymn to be bouncing around in your head all day today!

But our work has a place. The place is in response to what the Father has done for us in Jesus. The Rock of Ages, who is Jesus, becomes the foundation on which our lives of faith are built. The Holy Spirit uses the means of grace to make us God's workmanship that Paul talks about in Ephesians 2:10.

Our workmanship does not display our power or prowess. Like the heavens declare the handiwork of the Creator, the works of a redeemed sinner point others to the salvation that is worked only by Jesus alone. Our work is a response to and reflection of a grace and glory that we ourselves could never accomplish or achieve.

We become stewards of the treasure that is the Gospel. When we faithfully support the work of the Gospel of Jesus Christ with our financial support, we are doing the work which points to the One who alone atones. When we come alongside a struggling sister or brother for whom Christ died and we share the stewardship work of compassion and care, we enflesh the treasure of God's love and redemption. When we make it a weekly priority to arrange our schedule to be in the Lord's House with other stewards of the Gospel to receive again and again the Gospel's precious gift, we are stewards of the Body of Christ in the congregation that points even more people

We cannot do this. Jesus does it through us. We are simply stewards of this precious treasure!


Do you believe this?

One ancient tradition which is growing stronger little by little among the Hispanics is the belief that dead people return to earth to visit people. There is a special day to mark this tradition. It is called The Day of the Dead (Día de

Muertos), and it's held on Nov. 1st and 2nd. Many people believe that this great, ancient and historic tradition was started by the Indians before Spain's conquest. Actually, families decorate a special place in their home. This is called the Altar, where their dead love ones' pictures are displayed with



candles, colorful papers, their favorite meals and beverages, skull candies, and bread (Death bread). They believe that their relatives return from the dead to enjoy these items. The media contribute to this with live coverage from homes and even cemeteries, where people spend entire nights decorating with flowers and candles. Do you find some similarities to Halloween?





Hispanics who live in the U. S. want to preserve this tradition, even right here in the United States. As Christians we must reject this false tradition. Please read 1 John 3: 1b-3 "The reason the world does not know us is that it did not know him. Dear friends, now we are children of God, and what we will be has not yet been made known. But we know that when Christ appears, we shall be like him, for we shall see him as he is. All who have this hope in him purify themselves, just as he is pure."

What true and amazing words we find in the Holy Scriptures! These words become a great comfort to all as we come to believe in Jesus Christ. The unbelievers may not believe at first what the words say, but Christians need to continue sharing and proclaiming the Good News in Christ. We're confident and we stand on what He says:

"I am the resurrection and the life. The one who believes in me will live, even though they die; and whoever lives by believing in me will never die. Do you believe this?"

In the last weeks I have seen many faces of people which exhibit confusion, loneliness, bitterness, sadness, anguish, and desperation motivated by family troubles, divorce, sickness, death of a loved one, lack of or loss of work, etc. Words are not necessary when body language informs me that they are living through a difficult period in their life. Some of them have called and asked me to visit them in their homes or they



have come to the church office. They want to talk about their present situation and receive spiritual advice. They want a quick solution without any hurt or damage to their lives. Will they have a pleasant and happy Thanksgiving dinner?

Once I heard this: "It's so good that you don't have any troubles. I'm sure, all of your family is so happy, because, as Christians, God takes care of you". Well, you and I know that this is not true at all. Believers in Christ have all kinds of troubles and we all suffer at one time or another. We have a long list of troubles, right? So, can we as Christians give thanks to God when we are going through a difficult time?

I'm going to share this true story. It's a story my grandma used to tell. In a very small town, there lived a faithful Christian man. Every day before the sun began to shine, he prayed. He prayed aloud, and everyone in the town was able to hear him. My Grandma said he never failed to pray. It didn't matter what kind of day it was, sunny or rainy, cold, or hot. He prayed with gratitude and thanksgiving. My grandma said that he never complained even though he worked hard as a farmer. He always gave thanks to God for all the gifts he received.

I'm happy when I see joyful, loving families. Their faces tell me that God has been blessing them and showing me how He protects them in their daily lives. They know God is with them in all the circumstances of life. I'm pretty sure these believers in Jesus will have a pleasant and happy Thanksgiving dinner.
