From the Pastor's Desk – July 2026

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ:

What would you like our church to offer? Coffee? Casual Atmosphere? Dynamic and relevant sermons? A more welcoming atmosphere? More youth programs? A focus on environmental issues? Social activism? Inclusiveness? Tolerance? Varied styles of worship? Texting questions to the pastor during his sermon? Air conditioning? Lay-led services? Valet parking? A car-care clinic? A young, dynamic, and handsome pastor (sorry to disappoint)? A casually dressed pastor? A less formal sanctuary? A praise band? Liturgical dancers? Pizza night? Youth church? Lay readers? Clown ministry...

Okay, I think we can all agree that the above list has gone on *ad nauseam*, and almost certainly can proceed *ad infinitum*. Perhaps, for these reasons—particularly the latter—red flags should be rising in our minds.

So, on to the next question: Why? Why do we want to offer these things? The answer is simple, and it simply reveals a dangerous flaw in our understanding of the Church. We think these things and desire to offer these things so we might *attract* people to our church.

Since we are so immersed in it, we, as Americans, hardly notice it. The “it” of which I speak is consumerism. From your earliest memory you have been bombarded with offers. You have been plastered with offers of a happier life, a life of fitting in, a life of being connected, the attraction of the opposite sex. None of these things change who you are fundamentally—essentially. These “offers” do attract us for a simple reason: they affect the way we think about ourselves. They are so effective at this that if a particular product is not “consumed” we feel diminished as a person. Think about it. The latest product “x” is introduced, and we feel less than because we don’t yet have it (recall the recent Stanley thermal mug craze). We become ashamed because what we do have no longer seems to measure up. We contrive excuses to deflect our feelings. We also begin to trash our neighbor (the Eighth Commandment notwithstanding) because they have something we do not. Think about how we covet.

Most of us learn, with time and experience, how not to succumb to this. We learn the work it takes to earn money. We learn to prioritize our spending—sometimes the hard way. Sometimes we come close to going broke obtaining the latest whatever. So, we learn. We, however, still feel—and given that winning combo of numbered bouncing balls (which the Church and I neither condone nor endorse), we would be right in line for the next latest widgets. Then, when we get them, we show them off. “Look at this, it’s the latest...” “You wouldn’t believe how much this cost.” Or, if you’re from the Midwest, you couch your boasting in false humility: “Look at it. I got a great deal on it, so I couldn’t pass it up, and you know you really need this where we live” (...for my job,

for my kids, for the dog, to support the frogs in Uganda—the possibilities are endless). There's actually a term for this: "humblebragging." Think about how advertisers attract us with their endless offers (for profit and growth require the feeling and perception of obsolescence), and how they even give us the excuses we need to justify our consumption.

So, let's go back to our church and the Church. Starting with our church—our little slice of heaven. Can you see how consumerism affects the way we think about our church? We covet what we perceive to be other's success. "It's all about the numbers, you know." We often think that if we offer "x" it will attract. If you build it, they will come—so to speak. I hope you can see that offering to attract will soon have us chasing our tail and exhausting our resources—hence those little red flags of previous note. Ask yourself this: Can we compete (for that's part of this path—outpacing the competition) with the world? Can we compete with organizations—Christian and otherwise—with deeper pockets? What about the funny little points of the Truth—things that our Lord says—that we know will probably not attract, but repel? Do we ditch those because they're off-putting—because they're bad for business?

Let's move on to the Church—the larger church found outside our walls. Consumerism and marketing practices have come into the Church through a false theology. The theology is that you must make a choice for Christ—you must "accept" Him—again, a reason for the flags. (If you believe this, you should leave the next time we baptize an infant, for they neither choose nor accept. Yet, in Baptism, they are most certainly saved.) If we must bring people to the point of accepting Christ, then we should offer and do whatever is necessary to attract people and remove anything—any stumbling block—that might keep them from doing the same. This, however, is very wrong.

You see, in the Church, you are defined and made what you are solely through the work of God in Christ. You have, as we confess, been called, been enlightened, been sanctified, and you are kept in the one True Faith. We could say it like this: God chose you to be saved. He opened your mind to see Him and know Him and trust in Him. He makes you holy—perfectly so, and so you are. He also keeps you in the Faith. How? Through the Gospel. It is the Gospel of Christ that does these things, for there the Holy Spirit—the entire Holy Trinity—is there for you. This, my brothers and sisters, is what we "offer." How do you know that you are saved? I suspect most if not all of you would point to the Means of Grace that you receive in this place. You would be right to do so. Everything Christ wants His Church to be is right here. Boast in that. We preach Christ, we are baptized into His death and resurrection, we are absolved in Him, and we are fed His body and His blood. This is what makes the church Church, and you you. Nothing else can add to this or take away from it. So again, boast in that. This is what is given to us—declared to us—in this place, and it is all the work of God. Stop worrying about what we have and don't have. Stop bragging about anything other than Christ and Him crucified for you. Rejoice in Christ who has made you His beloved child. Pray that in this place this is the only thing that is "offered" to you.

You see, the Truth of Christ and how He saves us is not only deeply comforting but also comes with the promise that "not even the gates of Hell will prevail against it." It does not rely on what we have, or what we do or don't do. It relies solely on Christ, and Christ is an excellent thing to have. You *are* Christ's.

Have a blessed summer (and keep church attendance a priority).

Go ... Sell All You Have?

“What must I do to inherit eternal life?” asked the rich young ruler. Jesus said, “You know the commandments.” And he replied, “All these I have kept from my youth.” And Jesus said to him, “One thing you still lack. Sell all that you have and distribute to the poor, and you will have treasure in heaven; and come, follow me” (Luke 18:18–22).

When we hear this story, this question comes to mind: is Jesus speaking to us also, or only to the rich young ruler? In other words, is Jesus telling us to sell all that we have and give it to the poor?

As good Lutherans, we answer, “No!” But why? Why should we not sell all that we have and distribute it to the poor? The simplest explanation is this: if we sold everything we have, our wife and our children would be neglected. In other words, to sell everything we have and give it to the poor would ignore, even abandon, those whom God has placed in our care. Our money, everything we have, is not to be used solely for the church. But that doesn’t excuse us from using our money for the purpose God intends.

Everyone has three stations in life, three spheres in which we live and are to be of service to our neighbors. These stations are the church, the family and society. We are members of all three of these by birth. We are born into the church by water and the Word of God, and our duties to others in the church arise from our Baptism into the church. We are born into a family, and our duties to others stem from our birth into that family. Finally, we are born into society, which is simply a further extension of our birth into our family. The duties we have toward other members of society come from either our own birth or the birth of others into the same society.

All that we have and all that we are ought to be pressed into service for the church, the family and society. If we were to sell all we have and give only to one, the other two would be neglected, and we would falter in fulfilling our duties.

So, consider your life and all that you have in light of these three stations. You pay taxes to support and help those in society. You save for college for your children, and provide food, clothing and shelter for the members of your family.

But the station that is usually thought of last is the church. Since the needs of the family and society are more immediate, the church is often given what is left over. This is not how it should be. Rather, we are to give of our first fruits, from off the top, the best, even as Abel gave the best of his flock.

This requires forethought. It means that you sit down and make a plan of what you will give from the beginning. It means sticking to it even when it seems that there are other more immediate and pressing things.

And this is all the more necessary now as we enter into periods of time where giving is low due to high unemployment or where restrictions on meeting in church limit opportunities to give. If we love God and His gifts of forgiveness given through the Means of Grace, which we receive at church and only at church, then we will support it, just as we love our country and our family. For all that we have and all that we are is given to us by our gracious God. He spared no expense for us and our salvation. He gave up His Son to death so that our sins are forgiven, and we will live. What’s more, He provides for all that we need for this body and life. And our lives in this world, among these three spheres of church, family and society are to mirror the generosity of the one who gave us life in all three at birth.

Don’t let the church, your divine family, be an afterthought or even ignored. It is nurturing you, bringing you up in salvation through Word and Sacrament.

An LCMS Foundation Gift Planning Counselor just completed sharing a presentation about the importance of having a Christian estate plan, planning especially God’s gifts to family and ministry. Frank was present for the presentation. His mind had wandered at times during it, as he was contemplating what exactly he might want to accomplish. Frank came up to the counselor and said, “So what do you really do to help me in this process? I missed that part.”

The counselor responded, “I am your Christian friend. I will pray with you, discuss with you, and work very hard to become clear about what the Lord has laid on your heart to do. Having this clarity before you begin working with attorneys and financial planners is crucial, so that your plans are not vague, but laser focused. There is no cost for my service to you, but I bring value. We will organize your family and financial information. We will investigate how your beneficiary designations line up with your overall estate intentions. I will offer you some visual designs to get the wheels spinning in your mind, about the possibilities the Lord has given you, of which you might not be fully aware. Then we will gather all that information, sharing it with your advisors so that you step into those appointments, fully prepared to accomplish your goals. I can assist you in preparing a statement of your faith that will speak to family, friends and even fellow Church members, to encourage them in their faith. Finally, if you tend to get stuck on tackling a big project, I can encourage you to get started, and to keep going until you get it done. All of this we will work on, to assist you in being a faithful steward of the gifts the Lord has given you to manage.”

Frank said, “Now I get it. I think I could be helped by many of those things you just described. When can we meet?”

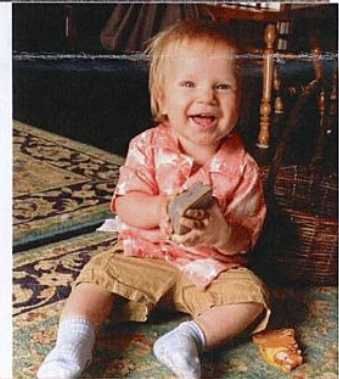

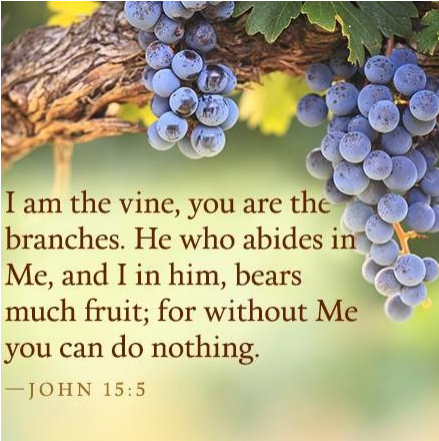

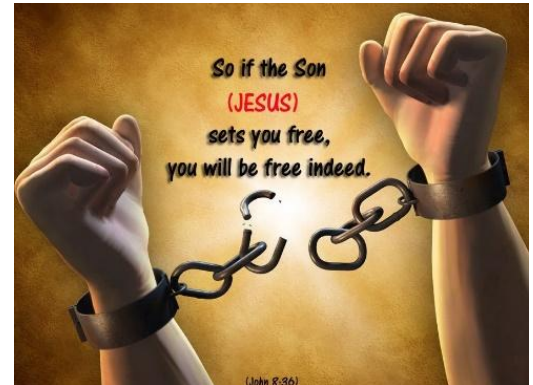
JULY 2026
